

Chicago, June 2.—The last report from Canada last night represents that troops were hurrying to the seat of war, and there is a confident expectation of a decisive result to-day.

Col. O'Neil, the officer in command of the Fenian army now invading Canada, is the person through whose last-mentioned Union soldiers were forced to choose between starving at Andersonville and entering the rebel army, and was in the battle of Franklin, Tennessee, where he was twice wounded.—He entered the rebels' service as Captain of the 10th Tennessee Regiment, and was afterward made Colonel.

Detroit, June 2.—All quiet. The Fenians recognize Stevens' authority, and do not sympathize with the Sweeney movement.

Gen. Sweeney was confidently expected, but did not come. To-morrow will prove whether this is true or not.

Detroit, June 2.—The details from the scene of the Fenian invasion which arrived this morning, show that no collision took place last night, and no blood was shed save the rumored shooting of Dr. Simpson Keevil, Mayor of Fort Erie, while reading the Riot Act.

Post Colborne, at the entrance of the Welland Canal, was occupied last night by Canadian troops, and several hundred volunteers were also last night within a short distance of Chippewa. The Fenian depredations are therefore confined to a few miles radius about Fort Erie. Volunteers are rapidly pouring forward to the neighborhood from every town on the Canadian railway. Gen. Napier directs all operations for the defense on the Niagara frontier. Matters in Detroit are very quiet, but over 1,000 men are stationed at Windsor, on the opposite side of the river.

Buffalo, June 2.—The river, last evening, from Blackrock to Tonawanda, was filled with small boats carrying Fenians to Canada. It is reported that three Fenian vessels, full of troops and some cannon, are at Gravelly Bar. The Niagara river was patrolled last night by the United States steamer Michigan, and the tugs Harrison and Farrer. It is understood that the patrol tugs fired on and stopped several boats.

Buffalo, June 2.—Gen. Grant passed west this morning, and telegraphed to Gen. Meade to assign Gen. Barry to the command of the Niagara frontier. Gen. Barry is here. A dispatch from Albany says that Gov. Fenton will issue a proclamation to-day, warning the citizens against countenancing the Fenian invasion of Canada. It is also stated that twelve regiments of State militia are to be called out.

LATER—11 A. M.—The Fenians evacuated Fort Erie this morning, moving toward the interior, with the reported intention of cutting the Welland canal. Two companies of volunteers, comprising 125 men, came down from Post Colborne at half past eight o'clock and took possession of Fort Erie, whence they sent out skirmishing parties in all directions.

ANOTHER INDIAN MASSACRE.—About the 19th inst., some fifty Chinamen were trudging their way to the mining regions of Idaho, about five miles before they reached the Owyhee river, when a large band of Indians, supposed to number two or three hundred, attacked them, and report says, killed forty-nine. One Chinaman alone, escaped to tell the news. Lieut. Pepon dashed to the ground with a squad of soldiers, and found thirty dead bodies. He immediately sent a dispatch to Maj. Marshall, who, at the time, was near this place with a company of cavalry of about fifty men. The Major left on Wednesday last for the scene of murder.—Our report as yet is meagre. However, it is stated that when Lieut. Pepon arrived at the place he found numbers of dead bodies mangled most brutally. In many places five or six were found piled together. The Lieutenant followed the trail about five miles, and found dead Chinamen all the way.—Idaho Index.

UNION men are foolish to exert themselves any longer for the good of their country. The San Francisco Examiner says the Democrats will surely elect the next President, and that no more constitutional amendments can be adopted. The thing is done; the game is up. Union men may now lay down their weapons and rest.

INDIAN STEALING.—Last night the Indians came within half a mile of Boonerville, about two miles from here, stole 65 head of mules from Briggs, Glenn & Wilson's train. Ten men went in pursuit. Capt. Bohannon is raising a company at this place to follow.—Idaho Index.

Ordinance No. 39.

AN ORDINANCE to License Hotel and steamboat Runners.

The people of Dallas City do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Any person who shall solicit patronage for a Hotel or Steamboat, commonly called a "Runner," within the corporate limits of Dallas City, shall therefor procure a License from the Recorder, and shall pay therefor into the city treasury the sum of Ten Dollars for every three months.

SEC. 2. Any person who shall do business as a runner, who by malicious misrepresentations shall injure, or attempt to injure any Hotel, Restaurant or steamboat, shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine in any sum not exceeding twenty dollars for each and every offense.

SEC. 3. Any person who shall do business as a runner without procuring a license therefor, shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine in the sum of twenty dollars.

SEC. 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the 21 day of June, 1866. Passed May 10th, 1866. G. B. GILMAN, H. CATLEY, Recorder. my2346t Mayor
