It has been suggested at frequent intervals during the present campaign that in the event neither candidate for the nomination for trustee receives a majority of the votes cast in the Democratic primary in December that the two leading candidates have a run off a few weeks later. This plan has been tried in Mississippi and elsewhere and it has given satisfaction, because the winning candidate receives a majority of the votes of his party, and this is one of the cardinal principals of Democracy. The plan, too, is growing in popularity, favor here as well as elsewhere, for it is seldom the case that when three or more candidates are contesting for the party nomination by primary election that the nominee has received the endorsement of his party by a majority vote. In a run off the nominee would receive a majority, and in this way we could ascertain who is the choice of the Democratic voters of Benton County. This is a matter, however, to be decided by the County Democratic Executive Committee. As the committee will have a meeting here on the first Monday to select the judges and officers of the primary election, it is more than likely the question of a run off between the two leading candidates for trustee will be considered at that time.

THE THREE-WIRE FENCE.

The law is Declared Effective Without the Action of the County Court.

The charge of Judge Bond that the three-wire fence is lawful, settles a question which is of much importance to farmers, says the Paris Post-Intelligencer.

Some years ago the legislature passed the law, but left it discretionary with the county court to make it effective.

A case was then appealed to the supreme court, and it was decided that the legislature had no right to delegate this authority to any court and that the law was effective without any further action.

It is simply a question of expediency. In Haywood, Fayette and other counties, where it has been tried, it is said to have given general satisfaction.

Being compelled to keep up their hogs, the farmers keep only a few, but have good ones which are given good care and attention. In this way it is claimed that better and cheaper meat is produced.

On account of the scarcity of timber the keeping up of the old wooden fences is one of the heaviest burdens the farmer has to bear, and if generally adopted the three-wire fence would be a great saving of expense.
