

### MEET AT NASHVILLE.

The following circular letter has been issued from the headquarters of the Tennessee Division, United Confederate Veterans, dated at Nashville September 1, 1908:

By action of the Tennessee Division, the convention will meet this year on October 14, 1908, at Nashville.

The convention will be composed of the following delegates: The Major General, the Brigadier Generals, the Adjutant General, and one delegate to every twenty members and fraction of ten of a camp. However, no camp will be entitled to representation unless it has paid its per capita tax for 1908 to General W. E. Mickle, the Adjutant General of the general association and the vote of each camp will be determined by a statement from him.

No proxies will be allowed, but one delegate can cast the vote to which the camp is entitled.

A list of the delegates should be sent to the Adjutant of the Division as soon as the delegates are elected, in order that he may have his report ready on the assembling of the convention. A list must also be sent Dr. A. A. Lyon, State Capitol, Nashville, especially designating what delegates will attend.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted at the convention held in Covington, October, 1907:

"Resolved, that each camp in the Tennessee Division, U. C. V., shall annually pay to the Adjutant General of the division a ten cents per capita tax for State purposes; be it further

"Resolved, that the Adjutant General of the division shall call for this tax when he sends notices for the annual meetings, and that no camp shall be entitled to representation until tax is paid unless the camp is also a bivouac and has paid said tax for State purposes."

Therefore, in sending a list of your delegates, you will send this tax to John P. Hickman, Adjutant General of the division, and he

will give receipts for the same.

The convention will be called to order at 3 o'clock p. m. in the Tabernacle.
