

Election Notice

Notice is hereby given that we, the Election Commissioners in and for Benton County, Tennessee, by virtue of the authority vested in us by law and an act of the General Assembly passed at the first extra session thereof, the same being chapter 50 page 603. of the published public acts of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly, and an ordinance passed by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the town of Camden, will on the 12th day of March, 1915, at the court house in said town of Camden, open and hold an election in said town for the purpose of ascertaining the desire of the qualified voters of said town as to whether the Board of Mayor and Aldermen shall issue bonds in the sum of \$20,000.00 for the purpose of erecting and equipping a public high school building in said town. The ordinance is as follows, to-wit:

An ordinance to provide for an election by the qualified voters of the town of Camden, Benton County, Tennessee, to determine the will of said voters as to whether or not there shall be a bond issue by said town for the purpose of constructing and equipping a public high school building in and for said town; fix the amount of bonds to be issued; the time for which said bonds shall run; the rate of interest same shall bear; the number and denomination thereof; the place and time of payment; how same shall be signed and become a debt; the method by which they shall be sold and the manner by which funds shall be raised to pay the interest on same and create a sinking fund with which to retire or redeem said bonds, as provided and authorized under the act of the first extra session of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly of the State of Tennessee for 1913, the same being chapter 50, page 603 of the published public acts of said General Assembly.

Be it ordained by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the town of Camden, Tennessee, that under and by the authority vested and conferred by chapter 50 first extra session of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly, that an election be called, opened and held in the town of Camden, Tennessee, to determine the will of the qualified voters of said town as to whether or not there shall be issued by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of said town, as authorized by said act of the General Assembly, bonds for the purpose of constructing and equipping a public high school building in and for said town; and that the Election Commissioners for the County of Benton, State of Tennessee, be and they are hereby requested to call, open and hold an election in said town of Camden on the 12th day of March, 1915, for said purpose; and that all qualified voters as defined by the act of the General Assembly of the State of Tennessee incorporating said town of Camden be permitted to vote in said election; that in said election all those favoring the issuing of said bonds will have written or printed on their tickets or ballots the words "For Bonds," and all those opposed to the issuing of said bonds will have written or printed on their tickets or ballots the words "Against Bonds."

Section 2. Be it further ordained that the said bonds, if authorized at said election, when issued, shall be for the sum of twenty thousand (\$20,000.00) dollars; shall bear date of the 1st day of April, 1915, and bear interest at the rate of five (5) per cent payable semi-annually six and twelve months from the date of said bonds and on

the same dates each and every year thereafter until retired or redeemed; said interest to be evidenced by coupons; shall be in denomination of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars each or a multiple thereof, and shall be issued in such denominations as the purchaser or purchasers may desire up to the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars; but no bonds shall be for a greater sum than five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars; shall mature and be payable as follows to-wit: Twenty thousand (\$20,000.00) dollars twenty (20) years from date.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, that said bonds, if issued, together with the interest thereon, shall be payable at office of the Recorder of Camden, at Camden, Tennessee.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, that said bonds, if issued, shall be signed by the Mayor of the town of Camden, and countersigned by the Recorder of the town, and shall be a binding debt or obligation against the town of Camden until the same are paid in full.

Sec. 5. Be it further ordained, that said bonds, if issued, shall be sold by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the town of Camden, after due advertisement thereof in such newspapers as the Board may deem best, at either public or private sale, to the highest responsible bidder, but no bid will be accepted for any of said bonds at less than their par value, and the Board will, in said notices or advertisements, reserve the right to reject all bids if not satisfactory and for par.

Sec. 6. Be it further ordained, that if said bonds shall be issued, an annual tax of sixty (60) cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars of all taxable property, that is, the property, real, personal and mixed, taxed by the State and county, in said town of Camden, be and the same is hereby levied upon all of said property, the same to be assessed and collected, and that all taxes thus assessed and collected, be used for the purpose of paying the interest upon said bonds according to their terms and creating a sinking fund for the redemption or payment of said bonds as the same may mature.

Sec. 7. Be it further ordained, that this ordinance take effect from and after its passage, the welfare of the town requiring it.

Ernest Pierce and Juney Webb of near Cross Roads spent the week-end with Eb Davidson.


Mr. and Mrs. Harper Hudson visited their daughter, Mrs. Emsly Deaton, near Cedar Grove Sunday.
