

**CHAPRER NO. 573
PRIVATE ACTS**

SENATE BILL NUMBER 1159

An act entitled an act to change the corporate limits of the Town of Big Sandy, Tennessee, and to repeal all acts in conflict with the same.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Tennessee, that the corporate limits of the town of Big Sandy, Tennessee, be changed, so that the corporate limits of said town shall be as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at the railroad crossing sign post, at the place where the road leading from Big Sandy, to Paris crosses the Louisville and Nashville Railway west of the old canning factory lot, and runs, thence south 6 degrees west 78 poles, to a stake, elm and post oak pointers; thence south 20 degrees east 80 poles to a stake a road, red oak pointers; thence south 41 degrees east 56 poles to a stake, red oak pointers; thence east 5 degrees north 120 poles to a stake in edge of Camden road, hickory pointers; thence south 2 poles to a stake, hickory pointers; then east 5 degrees north 28 poles to a stake in a field; then north 4 degrees east 180 poles to a stake walnut pointer; then north 15 degrees east 56 poles to a telegraph pole, standing on the north side of the Louisville and Nashville Railway in front of James Brown's dwelling; then east 13 1/2 degrees north 77 poles to a telegraph pole, with—mile post as a pointer; then north 21 degrees west 90 poles to a stake, red oak pointer; then west 20 degrees south 29 poles to a stake; then north 12 1/2 degrees west 24 poles to a stake, white and red oak pointers; then west 37 poles to a red oak; thence north 2 1/2 degrees west 10 poles to a stake; then west 6 1/2 degrees north 71 poles to a stake; then west 10 degrees south 13 poles to a stake; then south 5 degrees east 20 poles to a stake; then south 10 degrees west 60 poles to a stake; then west 4 poles to a stake; then south 33 poles to a stake; then south 35 degrees west 112 poles to the beginning.

Section 2. Be it further enacted, that section 2 chapter 200, page 442 Acts of Tennessee, 1903, the same being the act incorporating the town of Big Sandy, be and the same is hereby repealed and that the corporate limits of said town of Big Sandy be as set out in section 1 of this act.

Section 3. Be it further enacted, that this act take effect from and after its passage, the public welfare requiring it.


