### MAKING A STUDY OF COSTS AND METHODS

The United States Department of Agriculture is making a study of the costs and methods of marketing live stock, beginning at country points. The work is to be done mainly in a number of selected areas in important live stock sections of the country.

The plan is to select areas, usually consisting of several counties, and to study carefully the costs and methods of as many of the existing agencies in each area as can furnish any satisfactory information. The study will include mainly country buyery, local shipping associations, local elevators handling live stock, and independent shippers.

In several instances the work is being done in cooperation with the States. A number of men from the department are now in the field collecting data on the subject.
