## Archaeology in New Mexico.

(In the Sept.-Oct. issue of "The Archaeological Bulletin," published at Ottawa, Kansas, appears the following interesting article by our fellow townsman, Mr. Leslie A. Cardwell.)

It is probable that no state in the American Union contains within its borders a more varied and abundant supply of material for the student of archaeology and ethnology than New Mexico—ancient cliff dwellings, cave dwellings, picture writings, sculptures and earthworks as well as the more recent camp sites, ceremonial caves and pueblos are found more or less abundantly in every community.

Here we have a strange mingling of the ancient and modern the auto horn signals, aside the beaded brave, modern business blocks look down on adobe walls which three hundred years ago resounded to the muffled tread of the Conquistadors, while weird, unchanged rituals are practiced almost in the shadow of Christian churches.

In Mesa Verde National Park there stands a structure, the Cliff Palace, which can but fill the beholder with awe for its ancient builders, who without the aid of metal tools reared this building (over three hundred feet long, containing two hundred living rooms, and numerous assembly halls) which has so successfully withstood the storms of many centuries. Remembering that in this immediate vicinity there are three hundred and fifty smaller ruins, and looking at this great building perched beneath the roof of an immense cave, flanked with parapets and crowned with towers one can but imagine a feudal tower of the middle ages standing guard over a populous community.

The non-Pueblos are the Apaches on the Mesalero and Jicarilla reservations, and the Navajos occupying the Navajo reservation.

The government is taking steps to preserve our wonderful ruins and record for future generations the customs, languages and traditions of our modern Indians.—Las Cruces (N. M.) Citizen.
