



A Trip to Cuba.

The writer spent almost a year on this island, and well does it deserve the name "Pearl of the Antilles."

We left Nashville, Tenn., on Thursday and four days hence reached our destination, western Cuba.

The Dixie Flyer, like time and tide, waits for no man, after an eight hour lay over at Jacksonville, Fla., we boarded the F. E. C. for Key West, and the more than four hundred miles between the cities was an ever changing panorama. Here pine apples could be seen, there orange and lemon groves, and beyond palm beach, we saw our first coconuts growing. The everglades are a sombre and scenic view, at present the waste lands of Fla. Our cars are approaching the road that runs for miles and miles through the sea. It is known as the "Flyer System" and connects from Key to Key. After the U. S. government refused to tackle the job of giving rail connection between Jacksonville and Key West, Mr. Flyer undertook it and successfully carried it out, and to day the road stands as an everlasting monument to his genius and ability. The system is pronounced from an engineering standpoint to be a feat of the ages, space forbids to dwell on the subject.

St. Augustine the oldest of our American cities, was quaintly beautiful.

The bristling cannon, fortifications and steamers in the distance proclaim Key West.

The good steamer Olivette, (famous as a blockade runner during the Spanish-American war) was awaiting our train. Going aboard we were assigned state rooms, and then were allowed to roam at will. Our first step was to get acquainted with some of the cabin boys which we did, who took us up where we could view the wireless stations aboard the steamer. Truck after truck of mail was loaded, ton after ton of ice, then the whistle blew a warning signal, the rudders churned the gulf waters and in the language of the poet "she moves, she thrills, she seems to feel the breath of life along her keel." Key West is a receding speck on the distant horizon, now only sky and water are discernable, and its then out on the waters that one feels the insignificance of man and the greatness of God. Off to the lee-way a tramp steamer can be seen, a few hundred yards to our right a Norwegian vessel salutes us and the Olivette responds and passes. After some eight hours travel we are nearing Havana, Morro Castle can be seen in the distance.


