**Tom Carmack Arrested for Violating Espionage Act.**


Tom Carmack who is employed on the farm of Dr. S. E. Fowler was arrested Sunday by sheriff Sadler on a warrant issued by commissioner Barnes of Cookeville charged with violating the espionage act. Carmack was tried at Cookeville Thursday and bound over to the next term of federal court. He was released on bond. The warrant on which Carmack was arrested charges him with interfering with the military operation of the government and making charges against Red Cross members that are too obscene to appear of record.

The government is determined to see that all offenders of the espionage act are brought to justice, and the full penalty of the law dealt out to them.


