## Jackson County Goes Over Its Quota In United War Work Campaign.

## First County In The State To Subscribe Quota--Wins Beautiful Flag.

The whirlwind campaign for funds for the United War Work Organizations in Jackson County, resulted in the county being awarded a flag, for being the first county in the state to go "over the top" on the original quota. It is a beautiful flag of standard army bunting, 12 x 18 feet, and is something the county has aright to be proud of.

The success of this campaign was greatly due to united efforts of the Rev. J. D. Gunn, Jeff Wall and wife and Tom Presley, who rendered invaluable assistance. The Rev. Gunn is a preacher of powerful force, who presented the needs of the organizations so logically, that it was impossible to refuse to help, and Mr. Wall simply sang money out of the peoples pockets, and Mr. Presley, familiarly called "Tom" is one of the very best mixers ever. He had been engaged in Y. M. C. A. work at camp Jackson, and knew every thing about the work and what it is doing for our boys. His stay of several days in the county was an inspiration to the various district war workers. We hope to have all of these people with us again.

The county's quota was \$5,500 and \$7,550.00 was subscribed. The amounts subscribed by districts will be published later.
