Regular County Business.

The regular business transacted by the County court Monday was as follows:

J. J. Carrington, of the 9th district, N. L. Dixon and R. D. Sirey, of the 14th district were elected Notary Publics.

Virgil Ramsey of the 9th district was released from paying poll tax and working road, owing to defected eye sight.

The financial committee composed of David Hall, 15th district, O. G. Fox, 14th district, J. W. Chaffin, 12th district and W. M. Gailbreath, cashier of the Bank of Gainesboro, were elected to serve for the next two years. This is a very important committee, and the court made a good selection in the members of the committee.

The chairman was empowered to have the two government trucks assigned to the county, fitted with beds, so they can be used to haul gravel. In their present condition the trucks are useless. After the beds are placed on them, they can be used on any road in the county.

J. F. Williamson, Lee Carter and A. B. Hargis were appointed as a committee to have charge of the flooring of the bridge across Martin's creek at Granville. This is a county bridge and has been in need of a new floor for some time.

An order was made by the court, instructing the chairman to employ a janitor for the courthouse, on the completion of the sanitary toilet, which will need daily attention.

County Court Votes \$100,000 For Roads.

Tuesday's session of the County Court was held to hear W. W. House, chairman of the State Highway Commission, explain the proposition relative to the county joining the Federal and State Government in building a state highway thru the county, and what the county would be required to do to receive aid from the State and Federal authorities. As was explained by Mr. House, the first road, or road No. 1., is to be built first, running from Putnam county thru Gainesboro to the Clay county line, as designated by the State Highway Commission. As soon as this road is completed, and they figure it will be only 12 months from the time it is commenced, they will be ready to start on road No. 2.

Following Mr. House' address a motion was put before the court favoring a bond issue of \$100,000.00, at 5 per cent interest. The motion carried by a vote of 24 to 7. Those voting against the motion were: J. L. Clemons, M. A. Dycus, Sid Ragland, B. S. Stone, W. S. Hance, J. L. McCarver and W. A. Overton.

The road will be surveyed sometime next month, and work will begin about March 1, 1920.

A. O. Birdwell was elected County Tax Assessor Monday by the County Court, defeating W. F. Maddux in the eight ballot by a vote of 17 to 15. Shelby Hargis, who seemed to be third man had withdrew from the race at this time. Mr. Birdwell is well known over the county, having filled different offices in the past. He will make a good official.
