When arrested Thomas denied stealing the horse and stated he knew nothing about it. After spending a night in jail and then shown the horse by the sheriff he admitted it was the one he had rode from Kentucky.

The sheriff of Allen county, Ky., will arrive in Gainesboro, Friday, and Thomas will accompany him to Kentucky to answer the charge of horse stealing.

From reports it is learned that Thomas, who lives near Granville, this county, went to Allen county, Ky., several weeks ago to work. Two weeks ago he stole the horse from a pasture and rode thru to this county, where he swopped the horse to Jim Daws, who lives in the 7th district, for a watch, selling the watch for \$5.00. Later he went to Monterey, where his father, Stoke Thomas lives.

Sheriff Spurlock was notified the first of the week to apprehend Thomas, as it was thought he was in this county. The sheriff immediately started an investigation and had but little trouble in tracing his man to where he was arrested.

Thomas is young man 21 years old, and has a wife and one child at their near Granville, where he was raised.

The horse that was stolen is valued at \$160.
