**Remains of Roger Q. Lowe
Buried in Arlington.**

—Roger Q. Lowe, son of W. Q. Lowe of Oak Grove, Picket county who took part in breaking the Hindenburg line and was killed in action on Sept. 29, 1918, will be buried in Arlington cemetery Thursday.

Young Lowe enlisted in the state guard at Livingston July 4, 1917. After the state guard was federalized he became a member of Company B, 119th infantry, 30th division, going to France with his division. At the request of his parents his body was shipped back to the United States to be buried in Arlington cemetery.

Roger Q. Lowe was a volunteer and had the reputation of being a fine soldier and fearless fighter. He was a Mason and in every respect an admirable young man.

Roger Lowe was a native of Jackson and formerly lived on the north side of Cumberland river, on the farm now owned by D. B. Johnson.

Boy's Skull Crushed In Fall

Donald Lee, the 5 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Zollie Hackett, who reside on Wartrace, this county, was seriously hurt last Tuesday evening. The little fellow was playing in a Ford truck that was standing in the yard near the home, when the accident occurred. In his play he came in contact with the tail-gate with such force that it opened and he fell striking his head on the hard ground. He was carried to the house and Dr. Cornwell called. On examination the skull was found to be crushed just above the ear.

The boy accompanied by his parents and Dr. Cornwell was rushed to Nashville that night. Arriving there at an early hour he was taken to the Protestant Hospital and immediately operated on by Dr. Sanders. The operation was a very serious one, two large pieces of skull being taken out and replaced with silver plates. From the latest report it is learned that the chances are good for his recovery.

The parents have the sympathy of all in this sad hour.


