## Store House and Stock of Goods Destroyed by Fire Sunday Night.

The store house and large stock of merchandise belonging S. O., C. C. and J. C. Hackett located at Rough Point was destroyed by fire Sunday night at 9:30 o'clock. The fire was discovered by a neighbor who was setting up with a sick child and the alarm was given. In a short time a large number of the neighbors had arrived, but the fire had gained too much of a headway and nothing could be saved. It took a hard fight, to save the dwelling and barn of J. C. Hackett, which was only a short distance from the store.

The stock of goods was valued \$9,500, with \$6,000 insurance, making a loss of \$3,500. The store house was insured for \$500. The origin of the fire is not known, but it is supposed that a rat ignited a match which set some cotton bats on fire.

Mr. Hackett and sons have been in business at this stand 10 years and have built up a large business. They have another store at Dycus.

They will probably rebuild this fall and reenter business at this place.

## Criminal Court.

The July term of Criminal Court convened here Monday, with Judge Gardenhire presiding. Attorney general Mitchell and assistant B. C. Butler are looking after the interest of the state. A large number of cases have been disposed of, and as a result, several of the boys have been given rooms with sheriff Spurlock.
