## WOMEN TO CONDUCT CAMPAIGN FOR CHRISTMAS SEALS.

Women of Tennessee have answered the call to service again! This time it is in the campaign against death from Tuberculosis.

When the annual sale of Christmas Seals begins on Dec. 1st, throughout Tennessee, this work will be in charge of the four leading Women's organizations in the State. Heading the general committee in charge of this work is Mrs. Clarence S. Steward of Chattanooga, President of the State Federation of Women's Clubs, and she will be assisted by Mrs. Eugene Crutcher, of Nashville, President of the State Parent-Teachers Associations; Mrs. Minnie Allison Welch, of Sparta, President of the Women's Christian Temperance Union in Tennessee, and Mrs. John M. Kenny, President of the Tennessee section of the National League of Women Voters.

These four organizations will thoroughly cover the State in the seal sale campaign this year and advance reports on their preliminary work indicate a record-breaking sale of these little emblems of life-saving.

The Christmas seal has financed the fight against tuberculosis over the entire United States and a tremendous saving in human life has been made through the educational and relief campaign made possible through the sale of Christmas Seals.

In 1905 the death rate from tuberculosis in the registration area of the United States was 200 per hundred thousand and in 1920 this had fallen to 114. Carefully compiled figures show that each year 60,000 lives are saved in America as the result of this health campaign which is made possible through the sale of Christmas Seals.

The Women's organizations behind the drive this year are urging individuals and business houses to head the cry, "Be a life-saver," and purchase liberal stocks of these little Christmas Seals which cost only a penny each. Their use on letters and packages are urged by those in charge of the state campaign.


## Middle Tenn. Normal.
