No Provision for Work on Upper Cumberland.

A total of \$424,000 has been recommended for use in improvement work this year on the Lower Cumberland river, while no appropriation has been mentioned for the upper section, according to a dispatch received Saturday from Washington.

Should these estimates be entered in the new rivers and harbors bill, as recommended, no work on Lock 8, under construction near West Point, Tenn., will be accomplished this year, according to Lieut. Col. John R. Slattery, local United States engineer.

The recommendations, if accepted, will provide an ample amount for the lower river. Lock E. near Canton, Ky., can be completed this season, while much work may be done on Lock F. near Eddyville, the engineer said.

About \$458,000 is needed to finish building Lock 8. The fact that no appropriation has been recommended for this section will disappoint Nashville shippers who have been ambitious to make the river navigable as far as Burnside, Ky. Sites have been surveyed for Locks 9, 10 and 11. However, work will be throttled throughout this year, Colonel Slattery stated.

Overton County Has Another Murder.

LIVINGSTON, Tenn., March 14.—Burrus Copeland, age about 45 years, was killed at or near the company store of the Brier Hill Collieries at Crawford, this county, last night. No clue has been found as to who committed the crime. He was found lying near the store mentioned

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
above with nearly all his clothing burned from his body.

Mr. Copeland was a splendid citizen, a son of Lee Copeland of Rickman, this county, and a married man with several children. For the past year this county has had more than its share of killing, there being now five murder cases pending in the criminal court.—Nashville Tennessean.
