

FARMER SHOULD STUDY GRADES OF HIS PRODUCTS

Practically all of the products of the farm—livestock, grains, hay, fruit, vegetables, wool and cotton—are sold on grade at some time before reaching the consumer. In view of this producers are considering cutting down costs of marketing through the elimination of some of the middlemen should acquire themselves with the various grades requirements of, at least, their major products, says A. L. Jordan, marketing specialist of the Extension Service, University of Tennessee.

Whenever grades have been standardized so that products can be graded before they leave the farmers' hands and sell on the same grade until they reach the consumer, it makes it possible to greatly reduce the marketing costs. Under such conditions, it is of special importance that farmers and farmers' associations recognize the importance of preparing the product for sale and shipment according to the requirements of the fixed grades. The wool grower who is thoroughly informed on wool grades does not long continue to place on the market all the wool he has in one batch, the burry mixed in with the clear, etc. He realizes that his wool is going to come under the jurisdiction of some man down the line who will say to what particular grade it belongs and under which it must be sold and paid for. The same is true of other products.

In this day of rapid strides in cooperative marketing the farmer will profit most who studies the grading of his product and produces a quality product.

I have been trying to convince the farmer that if he is to be successful he must be as efficient a business man as the merchant, manufacturer, or transportation man.

The farmer must look ahead and anticipate markets, and it is for that reason I am calling his attention to the certain needs of the future in mules, draft horses and saddle horses. Last October I urged farmers to feed their surplus corn to hogs. I am willing for those who did so to say if it proved profitable. I want the farmer to get good returns on his labor and his invested capital, and with the use of good judgment he can do so.
