APPLE TREE BEARS SECOND CROP.

S. P. Pharris, one of the progressive young farmers, of the White's Bend community, was a caller at the Sentinel office Tuesday morning. Mr. Pharris presented the editor with some samples of second crop apples which he plucked from a tree in his orchard just before leaving home. The apples are small, being about $\frac{1}{2}$ the size of the first crop. The tree bore the first crop in July, they being of unusual size and quality. The first of September the tree shed its leaves, and in a short time put forth the second covering of leaves and blossoms, which rapidly developed, covering the tree with leaves of unusual dark green, and blossoms of usual size. The warm weather this fall has kept the leaves green and the fruit has remained on the tree until now. The tree covered with dark green foliage and bearing fruit at this season of the year, has attracted considerable attention, and is an unusual occurrence. Mr. Pharris does not know what kind of apple these are, but has two trees of the same kind. Last year the other tree bore two crops of apples, and this year failed to bare any apples.
