Those who hunt at Reelfoot Lake are required to have a Reelfoot Lake hunter's license, in addition to the state hunter's license, the cost of each being \$2.00. Said Drainage District begins at the road across Reedy Creek valley, generally known as Hall's Crossing, and extends in a north-westerly direction, generally, with said Reedy Creek valley to the Huntingdon and McLemoresville road and includes the lands embraced in the Engineer's report in this cause that are benefitted by the improvement proposed in the proceedings in this cause.
