**By-laws, Ordinances and Regulations Concerning the Sanitary Condition of the Taxing District of Johnson City.**  
 WHEREAS, by an act of the legislature of the State of Tennessee passed April 1, 1881, and approved April 6, 1881, to establish Taxing Districts of the second class and to provide the means of local government for the same, The Board of Commissioners of said Districts created such in pursuance of the provisions of said act, and vested with the power to make and ordain necessary and proper sanitary resolutions.  
 Now, therefore, we, Isaac Harr, J. C. King and W. M. Christian, having been duly elected and constituted a Board of Commissioners for the Taxing District of the town of Johnson City, Washington county, Tennessee, with a view to the immediate improvement of the sanitary condition of the district, and for the better government of the same, do hereby make and ordain the following Ordinances and Regulations:

**ARTICLE I.**  
 Section I. Be it ordained that a Board of Health shall be appointed by the commissioners which shall consist of three members, one of whom, at least, shall be a physician.  
 Sec. II. It shall be the duty of said Board of Health to inquire into and carefully investigate the sanitary condition of said district and upon complaint made by any one of the existence of a nuisance within the limits of said district, to examine the grounds of said complaint and report to the commissioners the true condition of the matter of complaint.  
 Sec. III. It shall be the duty of the commissioners upon the official report of the sanitary Board of the existence of a nuisance to take steps at once to abate or remove the same. 1st, by requesting the owner of the land upon which such nuisance is found or his tenant living thereon to remove or destroy it. 2nd, upon refusal or failure of said persons to remove or abate it, to instruct the marshal to remove or cause to be removed at the expense of the owner of the land upon which it is found or of the tenants living thereon.  
 Sec. IV. Any person refusing or failing to remove a nuisance upon notice given as provided in the foregoing section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction shall be fined not less than two nor more than twenty-five dollars and shall be held in custody until the same is paid or secured.  
 Sec. V. Any person who shall within the limits of said district allow or permit any stable, stock-pen, slaughter house or yard, sink, privy or sewer situated upon his or her premises to become foul or unclean or who shall place any refuse or noisome substance upon any of the public streets or alleys or foul the waters of any spring, well or cistern, or sell or offer to sell any kind of diseased or unwholesome meats or provisions, or who shall fail to use lime or coppers as other approved disinfectants in their privies, whereby the health of the inhabitants of said district is endangered, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be fined not less than two nor more than twenty-five dollars, and shall be held in custody until the same is paid or secured. And the nuisances specified in this section, unless promptly removed by the offending party, upon notice to do so, shall be abated or removed by the marshal at the expense of such offender.  
 Sec. VI. Be it ordained that these Ordinances shall take effect from and after the 21st day of July, 1884.

The Sanitary Board provided for in the above ordinances and regulations has been organized, and consists of Dr. E. S. Miller, J. A. Cargill and Eli McNeese.  
 They have already made a canvass of the district in quest of nuisances, and report stables, stock pens, slaughter houses in an unhealthy and dangerous condition. They are careful to emphasize their report upon the condition of privies generally within the limits of the district, finding only 5 or 6 that would be reported "properly kept," all the others stand upon the report marked foul, unclean, filthy. Dr. Miller of the Board of Health impressed with the danger of diseases and epidemics generated and lurking in these dens of filth, urges upon the Board of commissioners the necessity of immediate and prompt action for the correction of the same. He advises the use of lime or coppers at least twice or three times a week in privies and that close attention be given to stables, stock pens and slaughter houses. The Board of Health will visit the town frequently and all are asked to have their property in a condition to be favorably reported.  
 The Board of commissioners first of all are anxious for the preservation of the health of the inhabitants of the district and they are anxious to check and prevent the spread of diseases and epidemics in our midst would do more than all things else to check the progress and blight the prospects of our town, the above ordinances and regulations will be strictly adhered to and rigidly enforced.
