**HIGH SCHOOLS**  
All High schools in this county began their sessions Monday. The High School at Cookeville is being taught in the Dixie College building and has an enrollment this week of about 100, all High School pupils. The High School Board has fixed the following rates of tuition for all pupils living outside of the county:  
First Year..... \$2.00 a month  
Second Year..... \$2.50 a month  
Third Year..... \$3.00 a month  
Fourth Year..... \$3.50 a month  
All pupils in Domestic Science will be required to pay 25c a month laboratory fee.
