HAS MADE GOOD

Gov. Tom C. Rye has kept the faith, he has redeemed his promises, he is entitled to the indorsement of a second term.

This seems to be the sentiment all over Tennessee, especially among democrats. If there is anything in rewarding a public official for faithful services Gov. Rye will have no opposition for the nomination.

For several years Tennessee has been in the throes of strife and turmoil with law enforcement the issue on which candidates have made their campaigns for political preferment.

The state-wide prohibition laws were passed in 1909. Saloons, or "near beer" stands remained in operation in many places in spite of the promises of officials during campaigns to enforce the law as soon as elected.

So strong was the sentiment for law enforcement that many good men threw aside their political alignments and supported men of opposite political beliefs in the hope of securing law enforcement. However practically the same conditions continued with little abatement.

When Tom C. Rye announced his candidacy for governor he told the people that if they would elect him, governor he would enforce the laws. The people had heard this many times before but there seemed to be something in the tone of the gentleman from Henry county that caught the people and he was elected by an overwhelming majority.

Gov. Rye has been in office now one year and Tennessee is to all outside appearances a regular Sahara. True there are some bootleggers selling whiskey in the back alleys, but then men commit murders and steal in the darkness of the night.

What we started out to say was that the people too frequently complain because public officials fail to carry out their platform pledges and often we are justified in this complaint but now since we have a governor who has done just what he said he would do we feel like it would be an extremely bad example to fail to reward this faithful public servant. We therefore call on Gov. Tom C. Rye to make the race for reelection and pledge our support to his candidacy.

CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

The last legislature made provision for a constitutional convention to amend our present ancient and hoary fundamental law. Our solons acted wisely in that they left the question in the hands of the people.

The convention will assemble in Nashville and formulate such amendments as their judgment dictates and these amendments will be adopted or rejected by a vote of the people later on, the vote being on each proposed change separately, instead of as a whole.

That the Bowers law abolishing capital punishment is a law was finally made clear by the supreme court in affirming death sentence of Deaderick Segunes of Washington county. The court asked the governor to commute the sentence to life imprisonment, although the case occurred prior to the passage of the Bowers law because "Capital punishment for murder is no longer in accord with the policy of the state, having been abolished by the state for all future murders."

Rumors of candidates for state senator are beginning to wander over the district by grapevine and other sub rosa methods. Democrats of this district have of late years paid too little attention to the selection of senatorial candidates, and the rank and file have had but little to do with nominating. Candidates for this high office should announce early and set their views clearly before the people in order that a wise selection may be made.

There is considerable agitation as to an extra session of the legislature for the purpose of impeaching Judge Jesse Edgington of Memphis. Most of the newspapers of the state favor action, believing the charges against the judge are of such a grave nature as to demand thorough investigation. The general assembly is the only body having authority to take the matter up.
