

COUNTY AGENT'S ITEMS

Sixty men, composed of farmers, merchants and bankers, made the trip to east Mississippi last week to inspect the dairy farms. We had a most successful trip from every standpoint. We saw what we went to see, and a great deal more, and had a mighty good time, too.

We left Selmer Tuesday morning at 7:30. After visiting two mighty good dairy farms in Prentiss county we reached Guntown at 3 p. m. We were met there by seven cars loaded with wide-awake business men of Tupelo and were driven to two farms before reaching that town. After visiting the creamery in Tupelo we were taken out to the club house, where we were served some barbecue, followed by the best watermelons a man ever tasted. From 7:30 to 9 we enjoyed some very fine talks. Dr. Lloyd of Memphis, on "Present Economic Conditions Confronting Southern Farmers," and Mr. Robins, on "Good Roads," were thoroughly enjoyed. On Wednesday morning we drove to Aberdeen in one of the hardest rains we have experienced in some time. At Aberdeen we were met with another royal reception. We visited the creamery, where they make from 6,000 to 12,000 pounds of butter per day. We saw "some" butter. After a visit to the big hog ranch, where they feed from 3,000 to 5,000 hogs constantly, we were driven to the hotel, where we were served with luncheon. Here we enjoyed several good talks on dairying and also one by Prof. J. W. Fox of Secotts, Miss., manager of the largest cotton farm in the world, on cotton production.

In the afternoon we drove to Columbus and found the town wide open for our reception. After being served with supper we were taken to the Chamber of Commerce and entertained for an hour with moving pictures and practical talks. Thursday we visited the Mississippi A. & M. College and Experiment Station, which was thoroughly enjoyed by all. Friday morning we visited the dairy farm of Mr. Jim Evans at Malden. This is one of the best farms in the South. What we saw on the farm, linked with the plain common-sense talks of Mr. Evans, made the visit to this one farm worth the entire trip. The last of us reached Selmer just as the clock was striking 12 that night.

The trip was a most profitable one, our only regret being that we had failed to let the women folks in on it, and that others of our neighbors were not there to enjoy it.
