Connecticut had a two-foot snow last week.

Memphis had a \$50,000 fire Sunday night.

The Nashville American is on the fence on prohibition.

Maj. Carpenter has been appointed pension agent at Knoxville.

The school tax was raised from 10c. to 15c., this makes the state levy 45c.

Reports from the wheat growing States of the North-west are favorable for a good crop.

Engineer Barlow, after careful calculation, concludes that the Muscle Shoals canal will be completed by December next.

Jay Gould, the great railroad magnate, says he is satisfied with the railroad commissioners appointed under the interstate bill.

Dr. Z. L. Sowers, a well-known Washington physician, says President Cleveland's health is in danger. It is the result of over work.

The constitutionality of the law passed by the last Legislature relieving druggists of back taxes as whisky dealers is questioned.

The Senate failed to concur in Representative Hanna's bill to increase the permanent school fund from two to five million dollars.

The bill changing the line between Hardin and McNairy counties so as to include Adamsville in the former has passed the Legislature, but the bill giving Adamsville a branch court failed to pass.

A bill making it a misdemeanor for any person to sell intoxicating liquors within four miles of any school-house, public or private, whether the school is in session or not, has passed both branches of the Legislature and only needs the signature of the Governor to become a law.

The Tennessee Legislature, not content with voting down a measure for the better education of the children of the state, not satisfied with expressing disapproval of the idea of federal aid, emphasizes its view and puts up its true colors by refusing to pass a bill forbidding child labor.—Memphis Avalanche.

President Cleveland appointed, as Interstate Commerce Commissioner, Thomas M. Cooley, of Michigan, for the term of six years; William R. Morrison, of Illinois, for the term of five years; Augustus Schoonmaker, of New York, for the term of four years; Aldace F. Walker, of Vermont, for the term of three years; Walter L. Bragg, of Alabama, for the term of two years. Cooley and Walker are republicans, the others are democrats.

SCHOOL REPORT.

The annual report of State Superintendent Paine is before us. It shows that 7,307 teachers were employed to teach in 6,690 schools; 383,507 pupils were enrolled, while the average attendance was 278,276. It further shows that 78 was the average number of days taught, the average pay received by teachers per month was \$28 65, at a cost of 76c per pupil per month.

The question of the liability of certain druggists for privilege tax, notwithstanding the relief granted by the present General Assembly, will be settled by the Supreme Court in the early part of the approaching session at Jackson. An agreed statement of facts has already been made out, and the questions will be settled. The Attorney General for the State says the relief act is a nullity, and the executions will be issued at once on the judgements.—American.

WHISKY DEALERS.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, NASHVILLE, TENN. MAR. 23, 1887.—Mr. Editor—Dear Sir: By promise I send you a synopsis of my report to the Legislature as chairman of the special committee to ascertain the number of wholesale and retail liquor dealers in the state and the amount of revenue derived from them and the amount they are still due the state.

I find in Middle and West Tennessee 1647 parties who took out U. S. revenue license to sell whisky in the state for the year 1885, and I find by an examination of the Comptroller's books that the whisky men own, in the Middle and Western Divisions, \$50,871 28 for a single year. Nearly one-half of this amount is due from Shelby county, which has 647 saloons in it, while Davidson county owes about \$12,000 and has 345 saloons.

I also find 143 women (I like to have said ladies) in these two counties selling whisky. We did not succeed in obtaining any report from East Tennessee except the amount paid in, but if Middle and West Tennessee are to be set as precedent for East Tennessee there would be due from the whole state about \$65,000, which would be a handsome sum for an empty treasury. Now these are some of the excuses we received from county court clerks of the state: one wrote, "the privilege tax on whisky is too high and I can't collect it." To this we replied, "In 1880 the taxes were \$50, \$70, and \$100, now they are \$150. In 1880 you raised about one-third amount due, now you raise two-thirds amount due, so it can't be high taxes." Another says, "It costs less to do a whisky business in my county in violation of law than in conformity to law, for when the Judge fines a whisky seller, if at all, it is invariably a nominal fine and costs less to pay the fine than it does to take out license." Another wrote, "I did not know druggists were liable for this tax." Another wrote, "No such man as you say is in my county doing a whisky business," but when we told him to look in that back alley, he soon found him.

We found that the revenue from whisky dealers in nearly every case depended upon the watchfulness of the clerks, some of whom have had to issue distress warrants against the dealers to obtain the tax.

The delinquency of 1885 is less than two-thirds of the same for 1884 as an investigation was also made by the Legislature in that year, and the Comptroller served the boys up a little and has collected over \$50,000 of back taxes on a similar report two years ago. I will add, to the credit of most counties, that at least seven-eighths of the delinquents are in the cities and large towns. Respectfully, J. A. HANNA.
