It has been decided in Indiana Courts that the black-list is legal. The case was that of Drummond vs. Evansville & Terre Haute R. R. Co., and the court decided that where the employe goes out on a strike and quits work, his employe may let the fact be known without incurring any liability therefor.

One of the Acts of the last Legislature says that the prison commissioners may lease the convicts, as will least conflict with free labor. Yet there is to be 250 under lease at Inman and there is a number at Pikeville under lease to a citizen of Alabama. What do laws amount to when not adhered to?
