MUST BE SOLD.

So Judge Lurton Has Said.

Decision Holds That Consolidated Mortgage is Precedent to the General Mortgage.

Memphis, Feb. 11.—Judge J. H. Lurton, of the Federal Court, has decided that the Memphis & Charleston Railroad shall be sold and that consolidated mortgage is precedent to the general mortgage. Since the company defaulted in the payment of its mortgage coupons in 1893 there have been numerous suits of foreclosure filed, but the only one of them that has been pushed was that filed before Judge Lurton, in Nashville, during 1896, and argued before him some six weeks since.

The decree is to the effect that unless the principal and interest of the consolidated mortgage be paid within a "short day"—generally considered to be ten or twenty days—the road shall be sold for the benefit of the bondholders. The counsel for the plaintiff in the case will now draw the decree for sale and submit it to the Judge. In the event that the money is not paid within the specified time and appeal is not taken, the court will order a day for the sale and name a special master to conduct it.

On the Memphis & Charleston R. R., there are four sets of bonds. Of the first issue, \$1,048,000 are outstanding, of the second mortgage bonds, \$1,000,000 are outstanding and of the consolidated issue, \$4,700,000 were authorized, but only \$2,274,000 issued. For the latter mortgage the Farmers' Loan & Trust Company, of New York, is the trustee, and it was this company that filed the suit for foreclosure.

The general supposition in the city and among railroad men in general is that the foreclosure proceedings means the passing of the road into the hands of the Southern Railway.
