### MARION ON TOP.

Wednesday, June 23, at the Centennial.

Probably the finest display of fruits ever exhibited in Tennessee was to be seen at the Agriculture Building yesterday. They consisted of early apples, plums and peaches. Prizes were awarded to the best displays as follows.

Best display of early apples—1st prize, \$10, awarded to M. Dietzen, South Pittsburg; second prize, \$5 to C. B. Harwood, Una.

Best plate of early apples—First prize \$3 to C. M. Dietzen; second prize \$2 to J. E. Abernathy, Giles County.

Best display of early peaches—First prize \$10 to M. Dietzen; second prize \$5 to Mrs. D. S. Clark Nashville.

Best plate early peaches—First prize, \$3, Mrs. L. E. Price, Nashville; second prize \$2 M. Dietzen.

Best display of early plums—1st prize \$10, A. J. Graves White's Creek; second prize, \$2, P. J. Berckmans, Augusta, Ga.

The varieties of the various fruits receiving prizes were:

Apples—Early Harvest, Red Astrachan, Golden Sweet, June Pin and Red June.

Plums—Patan or Japanese plum and the Lincoln.

Peaches—Alexander and Prices Seedling.

It was necessary to see these fruits to appreciate their luscious qualities and beautiful appearance. The next display will be of early tomatoes, beets and blackberries, on July 1st.

Tennessee Central Sold. Crossville, Cumberland County, June 25.—The Tennessee Central Railroad was today sold to the highest bidder by Clerk and Master Dunbar.

Col. Jere Baxter bought the property for himself and associates (St. Louis and Chicago) for \$150,000. Considerable proportion had already been completed.

The road is to be built from Kingston, Roane, to Nashville, by way of Harriman, Rockwood, Crossville and Monterey. It will penetrate one of the richest mineral and timber sections of the State.

At Rockwood the road connects with the Cincinnati Southern and at Harriman with the Southern, and will materially lessen the distance from New York and Eastern cities via the Norfolk & Western and the Southern. The purchasers say they will complete the road at once.
