MORE RAILROADS IN THE VALLEY.

The Sparta correspondent to the Nashville correspondent is authority for the following:

"It is learned from a very reliable source that the Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis railway will at once extend their line from the present terminus at Bon Air to Pikeville, a distance of some thirty miles, passing through the enormous coal fields of the Bon Air Coal, Land & Lumber Company. Of the extension some twelve or fifteen miles will be in White county."

This makes the opening of the new mines at what is known as the Green place by the Bon Air company a certainty, and the coal at that place being a fine quality of coking coal, it is the intention of the company to put in coke ovens as soon as possible. A corps of engineers are now at work surveying a route.—Pikeville Banner.

Work on the new railroad branch at Sequachee College is going right ahead. The citizens of that place boast that they will ship coal before Dunlap does. That is all right if they do, but they are reminded that there is considerable work ahead of them they must do before they ship any coal, and the work on our incline and branch road is nearing completion while theirs is just beginning.

But ship coal whenever they may we are glad to see Dunlap and Sequachee College forging to the front in the line. The citizens of these two places should congratulate themselves on having two enterprises of the kind in their midst.—Dunlap Tribune.

GIGANTIC COMBINE!

Three Great Southern Industrial Concerns

WITH \$100,000,000

CAPITAL TO COMBINE

Tennessee Coal and Iron, Sloss-Sheffield and Republic Steel and Iron Companies to Consolidate Their Business.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., March 11.

—Rumors of the consolidation of the largest industrial corporation in the South with a combined capital of nearly \$100,000,000, are current in this city. The three companies are the Tennessee Coal, Iron & Railroad Company, the Sloss-Sheffield Steel and Iron Company and the Republic Steel & Iron Co., which together own twenty eight iron furnaces, one steel mill and two rolling mills in Alabama and Tennessee and make the bulk of the iron in these two states.

These companies own besides the industrial plants mentioned many acres of valuable mineral lands and are operating many coal and ore mines, the outputs of which are consumed in their own furnaces and mills.

The combined capital and bonded debt of the three companies is \$93,000,000 divided as follows: Tennessee Coal, Iron & Railroad Company, 23,000,000; Sloss-Sheffield Steel & Iron Company, \$20,000,000; Republic Iron & Steel Company, \$50,000,000.

The majority of the properties of the Republic Company are in Ohio and Illinois, but its holdings in this district are considerable. Its rolling mills make about 97 per cent of the mill products of the entire country.

The principal officers of the Tennessee and Sloss-Sheffield companies are absent from the city attending the annual meetings of the company, being held respectively in Tracy City, Tenn., and New York City, and as the principal offices of the Republic Company are located in Chicago, no statement could be obtained regarding the rumors. It is stated in this connection that it was deemed advisable by the promoters of the United Steel Corporations not to include the Southern properties in the big combination, but let them remain outside to refute the cry of "monopoly which has already been raised in some quarters.

Forest fires destroyed valuable property such as fencing, out-houses, etc., near Clarksville.

A Rochester, N. Y., firm is investigating Memphis with a view to starting a rolling mill.
