RE-INCORPORATED.

THE DOG LAW.

Following is the Hashaw dog law as passed by both houses of the Tennessee legislature:

"An act to protect persons and property from injury by dogs going at large."

"Section 1. Be it enacted by the general assembly of the state of Tennessee, that it shall be unlawful for any person to allow a dog belonging to him or under his control or that may be habitually found on premises occupied by him, or immediately under his control, to go upon the premises of another, or upon a public road or street providing, however, that this act shall not apply to a dog on a hunt or chase, or on the way to a hunt or chase, nor to a dog guarding or driving stock, or on the way for that purpose, nor to a dog being moved from one place to another by a person owning or controlling the dog; nor to a dog upon which its owners shall have paid to the county trustee or treasurer one dollar and taken a receipt therefor, specifically describing the dog upon which payments is made, so as to distinguish it from other dogs. The payment to be made and the receipt taken therefor before the date of the offense, and within one year thereof, but the foregoing exemptions shall not apply unless all damage done by dogs therein exempted to the person or property of another shall be paid or tendered to the person so damaged, or to his agent, within thirty days after the damage is done."

"Section 2. Be it further enacted, that the county trustee or treasurer shall enter in a well bound book kept for that purpose, the receipts describing each dog upon which payment is made, the book to be paid for out of the receipts arising from this act, and he shall have out of said fund 5 cents for each entry, this fund to be applied to the common school fund."

"Section 3. Be it further enacted, that any person violating the foregoing section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction he shall be fined not less than two dollars nor more than \$50."

"Be it further enacted, that this act shall take effect thirty days after its passage, the public welfare requiring it."

"Section 4. Be it further enacted, that any person violating the foregoing section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction he shall be fined not less than two dollars nor more than \$50."
