THERE is lots of criticism about the change in the location of the county road just below town to go via the Bennett Spring especially since the road as laid off now is as good a route as could be selected. Why cannot the commissioners let this half mile of road remain as laid out now which seems to the citizens generally good enough for all practical purposes and use the amount saved thereby in moving the location of the pike further from its present most dangerous position near the railroad between this city and Victoria. Some people insinuate that they changed the road to suit Mr. Bennett, but we hardly think Mr. Bennett cares a rap where the road is laid out as long as he is able to reach it conveniently from his premises, and we believe he is too public-spirited a citizen to insist that the road pass his front door just to accommodate him. The commissioners should examine these points thoroughly from all sides before building the roads, investigate the cheapest constructed and most practical route, and if possible let the citizens know their reasons for selecting the same, and right here we offer the columns of the News free to them for such purpose. Such a course will do more to keep down public criticism which waxens fierce at times over points connected with the building of the pikes.

THE question of printing 857 words in a space 2 1/2 x 3 1/2 inches is worrying state editors, and the discussion has been assuming large proportions. And just think! the city dailies are so concerned about the country newspapers not being able to print the ballot for the August election! Any country newspaper possessing 6-point Roman body type can print the ballot according to Mr. Romine, editor of the Pulaski Citizen and author of the bill, who believes it can be condensed into 500 words by using the caption. The question has been placed before the Secretary of State to make decision in the matter, but as far as we can learn no decision has yet been made. It is a question which affects the validity of the ballot in the coming election, as Mr. Romine's bill provides that the amendments to the constitution shall be printed on the ballot.
