Quite a lot of moving, shifting, changing, transferring and conveying took place up here last week. Julius Pickett and family and J. J. Bowman, James Williams, R. F. There will be millions of dollars worth of valuable timber got out and put on the market out there and it will help increase the money circulation among the poor up here.

So I went to the well and I heard one of those awful screams that make a man's hair stand straight up on end and it was up in a tree. I went to the tree and called for a lantern, and here came the whole family to see old dad bring the "Whistling Jack" down with his Krag Jorgenson, but when the light flashed on it, it was our poor old crippled tomcat that somebody had caught in a trap and hurt very badly, so when he went up the tree he couldn't come back down, as one leg was almost severed from the body. So, you see, readers, a person ought to investigate these strange noises before becoming needlessly alarmed.
