The "open shop" policy of the United States Steel corporation has resulted in war being formally declared by the leaders of organized labor throughout the United States and Canada. This paragraph of the resolution they have prepared for presentation to President Taft is good. The rest of the resolution states the miserable history of the case.

"The United States Steel corporation has declared war on labor. In its secret councils this corporation has decreed that the only obstacle to its complete sway—organized labor—shall be crushed. The labor organizations consist of its employees, the workers (their wives and little ones), human flesh and blood. It is by their labor that they live; they have no purpose other than safeguarding their lives, their characters, their future, the safety of the republic and humanity. These factors now confront each other. By their purpose, attitude and actions must they be judged."

He further says, "The citizens of the county know best its needs. They are to act not only for themselves and their children but for future generations." Of course the building should be of substantial material, built for a century to come and have everything that the present age can supply for the convenience and comforts of the thousands of young people who will pass its course. Locate it at the most practical point in the county, put into its construction and equipment \$30,000, and you will have a high school building to which you can point with pride. No need of a hurtful agitation on this public question, but let all the people do some right thinking along correct lines, and then let the board of education for the high school proceed to locate it at the place that they in their godly judgement believe to be to the best interests of the children of the county. No fair patriotic citizen would allow any personal or local interests to swerve him in a matter of such grave importance.—Jasper Statesman Democrat.


