WHISKEY REGULATIONS

How the Law Effects Consignees of Liquor to Tennessee Points.

The new laws passed at the recent session of the legislature presents some very interesting points regarding shipments of whiskey in Tennessee. The following instructions were sent out by the General Superintendent of the Southern Express Company, Oct. 18, to all its agents:

"Packages containing not more than one gallon of intoxicating liquors may be accepted at points without the State of Tennessee to be delivered at points within the State of Tennessee to a consignee for his personal use or for the use of the members of his family residing with him; such liquors may be transported for priests or ministers of any religious sect for sacramental purposes or for dealers who are authorized under the Statutes of Tennessee to ship intoxicating liquors from points within the state to points without the State of Tennessee."

"The above are the only exceptions to the rule that no such liquors shall be transported or delivered within or into the State of Tennessee."

"Such liquors as may be transported as above authorized shall be delivered only to the consignee; that means not on the order of the consignee."

"Before making delivery, the destination agent of this Company shall require the consignee to sign and deliver to him a written statement in substance as follows:

"I hereby state that my name is _____ that my Postoffice address is _____ Tennessee; that I am more than 21 years of age; that I am the consignee to whom a package containing _____ of intoxicating liquors was consigned at _____ on the _____ day of _____, 191____ to be used for _____ Signed and dated at _____ Tennessee, this _____ day of _____, 191____"

"It is the duty of the destination agent to keep a record of all liquors delivered and file with the county court clerk a statement in writing setting forth the date on which said liquor was received and delivered, the name and postoffice address of the shipper, and the consignees, the place of delivery and to whom delivered, and the kind and amount of intoxicating liquor delivered."

"No liquor shall be transported from one point in Tennessee to another point in Tennessee."

From this it would seem that the Express companies are going to lend their assistance to the upholding of the laws, and these regulations will effectually put the bootlegger out of business."

Now, then, is the time for all law-abiding people to give them proper encouragement by cheerfully complying with the regulations of the Express companies. The rules will not work a hardship on any man who is willing to do his part toward upholding the laws, but it is a deadly stroke for the bootlegger who sells to the small boys and to anyone without discrimination. No one can send an order to the agent for his package now for the reason that the one bringing the order cannot sign the Certificate as the original purchaser. This is "the unkindest cut of all" to the bootlegger, who in times past managed to never have to sign his name for anything."

State-wide prohibition now begins to loom and only needs the encouragement of law abiding people to make it thoroughly effective all over Tennessee."

Interstate shipments of one gallon or less may be delivered to any one as heretofore for personal use, and under the before stated restrictions."

20TH CENTURY JUBILEE MEETING

The Twentieth Century Jubilee Convention of the Anti-Saloon League of America, will convene at Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 10 to 13. It is estimated that 20,000 delegates will be present.

The Tennessee delegation will be headed by Gov. B. W. Hooper, Ex-Senator W. R. Webb, Ex-Senator Newell Sanders, Hon. Newton H. White, Speaker of the State Senate; Judge S. H. Williams, floor leader of the temperance forces in the Senate; Hon. W. K. Abernathy, leader of the Temperance or Fusion forces in the Lower House and many other temperance representatives from the Tennessee legislature. These will be joined by the Officials of the Anti-Saloon League, including many members of the State Executive Committee, many of the leading pastors and heads of leading institutions of learning of the state.

It is desired that Tennessee, one of the nine Prohibition States, shall be well represented at this Convention, and now that the sentiment indicates such a splendid forward movement for Law Enforcement, it makes it all the more important that the State shall be in a position at this Convention to show by her representation that the good people of the Volunteer State are not only for State, but National Prohibition. She should be able to emphasize the fact that the four years' crisis through which she has passed in the effort to enforce the prohibition laws, has been retarded for the want of necessary law enforcement legislation and show that the failure to enforce the laws in the large cities has been due to the fact that officials have been in league with the outlawed liquor interest."

JOHAN HENRY HEER.

TRACY CITY, Tenn., Oct. 27.—A death of a prominent and aged citizen of this section occurred here recently when Johan Henry Heer died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Anna Marugg. His death occurred after an illness of three weeks. He was a pioneer citizen of this part of Tennessee, having resided for a number of years at the famous Swiss Colony at Grunetli. Born in Glarus, Switzerland, in 1820, he was 82 years old. Forty years ago he came to this country, and became identified with the growth of Grundy County. He was of a peace loving disposition and held in high esteem by all his associates.

He is survived by three children, Mrs. Anna Marugg of Tracy City, Mrs. D. C. Hughes, of Atlanta and Mr. Henry Heer of Nashville, eleven grandchildren, Mrs. Alf Law of Chattanooga, Mrs. Rufe Chrisman, of Nashville, Misses Barbara and Edna Marugg, of Tracy City, Mr. Chris Marugg of Birmingham, Ala., Messrs. Jake, John, Fred, Henry, Kasper, and Peter Heer of Nashville, and seven great grandchildren, Alfred and Halbert Law, of Chattanooga, Anna Chrisman and Albert and Louise Heer, of Nashville.

The remains were interred in the City Cemetery at Tracy City in the family lot, services being conducted by Rev. William Haskell DuBose, of Sewanee, pastor of the Episcopal Church. BUD RUSSELL

ARRESTED

Was in Charge of a Saw Mill Near Scottsboro, Ala.

Bud Russell was arrested Monday near Scottsboro, Ala., and put in jail at that place for some trouble over timber management. He has been operating a mill for John Mitchell, of Scottsboro and was entrusted with a large sum of money by Mitchell for the purpose of paying off the hands and for the timber as used. The timber was bought from the different owners there and one of these men seems to have brought on the trouble in which Russell is involved. His brother, J. M. Russell, received a telephone message to this effect Monday, but in talking with the sheriff could not understand fully what was the matter except that it would take about \$900 to make him a free man. He telephoned to his son, Will Russell, who is lawyer at J. H. Northcut's prop mill on Whitwell mountain, and together they left Tuesday morning for Scottsboro to settle the trouble. It is believed that it is a case of grudge as Russell had a difficulty with the man who is now causing him trouble some years ago in which Russell came out victor, whipping the other.

LAST GATE PUT IN AT LOCK AND DAM

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Oct. 27.—The last opening through the Hale's Bar Dam, which allows the current to pass the giant structure, will be closed tomorrow. The large steel gate which has been hung on the upstream side of the dam will be lowered into place early in the morning, and the work of concreting up the opening will be begun. With this done, the constructive work at the \$9,000,000 dam will be complete. The water at the dam has risen to within about eleven feet of the crest of the work. With the continued rains the top should be reached within a short time.

The newly organized National Bank of Pikeville will absorb the business of the Citizen's Bank Jan 1, 1914, a trade having been effected whereby the Citizen's Bank will take stock in the new bank and turn over their business and fixtures to it. UNCLE TOM'S LETTER

Some folks believe Socialism is dead. Not by a jugful. It is the liveliest thing in the world. Did you know that the Socialists are a power in the church? Have you read the report from the Southhampton Episcopal Congress? If you have, you know the social problems were discussed by Philip Snowden, a leading Socialist member of Parliament, and also by the Rev. Conrad Noel, a prominent member of the Christian Socialist League, and other great speakers.

Our Protestant Episcopal brothers are very catholic in spirit and the church is reawakening to the social conscience. We are looking for a nation to be born to the principle in a day as foretold. We've known for a long time the Episcopalian people had more of the Socialist spirit than any other class of christians on earth except the Christian Congregationalist Socialists themselves. Some people believe Socialism is a religion. Well, what if it is? Does that lessen its power and influence? What is the key note of religion? Is it not "Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven?"

Then, in studying the will of God, we find it all means just about this: Love God and thy brother. I don't think a religion of human brotherhood is enough, but I think it must recognize the fatherhood of God. A Socialist who denies God may be a Socialist, and may also be a lover of man, but his Socialism is not a religion. Yet we are commanded to love our neighbor as ourselves.

I am a Christian Congregationalist Socialist and the best teacher on the Socialist doctrine I can get is the Bible. Socialism may be a passion for humanity now, but the real Socialism of the future will be Socialism in God's name. Therefore I am not afraid that Socialism will destroy any man's religion that is real and genuine, but it will cripple this narrow selfish stuff so prevalent around us, and we all know no church is doing what it is commanded to do and because we socialists sometimes criticize them for not looking after the poor of their particular church we are charged as being enemies of the church. Why, bless your hearts, friends, all we christian Socialists want is for men and women to live their religion and provide for and help their own households, which they are not doing. Plenty of poor in your own church, brother, you could help and ought to help, but do you do it? I am not fighting our Episcopalian people for I am proud to note they are wide awake along the line of doing something. They have the cooperative spirit and are doing much to educate and provide for the poor and the children of the poor. We Socialists don't preach discriminative doctrines, spiritually or morally. We want to lift the whole human family to one high common level, and we can't see for our life how men can claim to be christians and set aside the two great commandments.

Some of the worst oppressors of labor are church members. Just what they base their religion on is a puzzle to me. Why, they are so autocratic and despotic toward their employees they won't allow them to organize or do anything to better their conditions. I must confess I don't understand upon what hope such oppressors expect to enter heaven. Merely belonging to a church will not save such men. As a Socialist my religion is to help men and when I go to the ballot box I want to vote with that end in view. No Democrat or Republican can be what he ought to be in the sight of God and vote to perpetuate a system of government that makes it possible for a few men to oppress the many, and that is exactly what is being done at the present time. St James refers to such

and I believe all the prophets and apostles have entered their protest in language much stronger than your humble servant can. You cannot please God and not be a cooperative being and it is all folly to say you can. I am for a co-operative system of Government that will help men to better conditions without a lot of tyrannical grafters and bosses. Some folk sought to read the 33rd chapter of Mathew and try to understand it. We socialists oppose laying heavy burdens on the people and calling them "Rabbi," etc. We believe God gave us a plan and a system of government that beats anything man has ever devised and if his plan and system is not good and practical why do all the churches claim they are governed by it. Oh, I wish they would live the life of a real follower of Christ, and then we would have all that the Socialists are seeking, but we all know they don't do it. Hence our working men have lost confidence in ever getting any help from the church, and their preaching is nothing more than sounding brass and tinkling cymbal.

Workingmen want a little of heaven here on earth. They are anxious about their wives and little ones, and I fear many of them have actually lost all faith and confidence in christianity, as it does so little in their behalf.

There are many things I could enumerate to show the great need of a bold, fearless christianity that would encourage our workmen to make extra exertions to free themselves from the yoke of bondage, but alas, Mammon seems to be bossing the whole thing at present.

Now, in conclusion, let me say, if you are a real simon pure christian, you are about as good a Socialist as I want, but do not ever vote to perpetuate this system of government that oppresses and makes paupers of more than half of your fellow creatures. Don't create a hell here on earth for them. Two bells for human beings is one too many. Vote to abolish the earthly hell for poor folks and then if rich people will persist in going to an eternal hell you will not be to blame. Vote for a cooperative system of government.
