

TO NOMINATE BY PRIMARY

Republicans of Marion So Decide in Convention.

W. H. WHITE ELECTED EXECUTIVE CHAIRMAN

H. R. Gilliam Will Serve as Secretary--Executive Committee Appointed.

The Republican Mass Meeting at Jasper Saturday was well attended. A primary was decided on for Saturday, Feb. 14, and organization made for ensuing two years by the selection of W. H. White, of Whitwell, as Chairman, and H. R. Gilliam of Battle Creek, as Secretary, and the appointing of an executive committee.

The meeting was called to order at 1:30 p. m., in the court room by F. M. McCullough, Chairman of Executive Committee. Nominations for Chairman were immediately in order. H. R. Gilliam, of Battle Creek, was nominated by J. W. Brown, and W. B. Rogers by G. W. Kilgore. Mr. Brown withdrew his nomination and Mr. Rogers was elected Chairman by unanimous vote. H. R. Gilliam, Millard Thach and J. W. Morrison escorted Mr. Rogers to the chair, who thanked the convention for the honor accorded him. W. C. Hill, representing the News, was honored with the office of secretary of the meeting.

J. W. Morrison moved that committees be appointed on permanent organization and resolutions: The Chair appointed as committee on resolutions, Foster V. Powell, J. W. Morrison and Morris Westmoreland, and as committee on permanent organization, G. W. Kilgore, M. A. Heneger and G. W. Walsh.

During the absence of these committees brief addresses were made by the following candidates: Jas. Kelly, W. M. Lee, G. W. Coppinger, H. M. Minnis, S. I. Statton, P. S. Harris, J. C. Higdon, B. Long, H. L. Allen, J. W. Brown, Steve Rogers, Byron Graham, Joe Kilgore, E. E. Johnston, K. D. Curtis, C. A. Quarles.

It was moved by D. A. Tate that a committee of five be appointed on Executive Committee. The chair appointed M. D. Brewer, N. F. Thomas, D. A. Tate, Millard Thach, and G. W. McCullough.

Committee on resolutions reported as follows, report read by J. W. Morrison, its chairman:

We, your committee appointed on resolutions, beg leave to report that as such committee we believe in the Republican party with its progressive and its policies heretofore pronounced, believing that the Democratic administration is, as it has always been, detrimental to the people as a whole, and that the acts of Congress and the Senate on the tariff and the money question, will be detrimental to the people at large, and bring times not wanted to the American people as a whole. We, in mass convention, endorse the Republican party in all its undertakings from the days of the great and grand old Abraham Lincoln up to the present date, and we recommend in this, the county of Marion, that a primary be held some day in the future as will meet the will of the people here assembled, and that we all pledge our allegiance to the Republican party and its principles of all the past.

Address was made by W. H. White, the newly elected Chairman of Executive Committee, who was presented by Chairman Rogers.

Matter of date for primary was then taken up, the resolution preceding having declared for one. The date, after considerable discussion, was refer-

red to the candidates present, who, seventeen in number, withdrew to decide for themselves. Report was brought in by H. M. Minnis that 10 candidates wanted primary in two weeks, 5 in three weeks, and 2 in six weeks. It was decided to let this remain as the expressed wish of the majority of the candidates, and hold the primary, Saturday, Feb. 14, 1914, at the legal voting places. It was decided to place the matter of conducting primary in the hands of a committee, which the chair appointed as follows: J. G. Lankester, chairman, F. M. McCullough, J. W. Morrison and B. B. Alder. This committee went in session with the candidates immediately after the convention.

Raulston were prominent in the debate, which was keenly fought.

The convention then adjourned, leaving the matter of primary to the committee appointed as above to make rules and regulations.
