I have just a faint remembrance of Billie Benton and Andrew Lewis. I think they were killed in the battle of Seven Pines or Gettysburg. They were never heard of after that.

WILL LET THE PEOPLE VOTE ON SUCH MATTERS
 Question was raised by a recent publication from Whitwell whether W. M. Cameron was for bonds. To settle the matter The News forwarded the following to Mr. Cameron for reply:
 "W. M. Cameron,
 South Pittsburg, Tenn.
 "Dear Sir:
 "A writer from Whitwell to the Chattanooga News says that you and W. H. Wilson were both for bonds, or words practically to this effect, and he also claims a victory for bonds in the recent republican primary, which is still unsettled. The first part of this statement places you in line with the unjust tactics of Mr. Wilson, and we want a written statement from you for publication as to your methods of handling such questions, whether they will be by public approval or by force methods.

 Following is Mr. Cameron's reply:
 "News Publishing Company,
 Sequachee, Tenn.
 "Gentlemen:
 "I am just in receipt of your letter of this date, and I take pleasure in replying.
 "In my first statement to the public when I decided to enter the race for floater, I said that I would not pass or allow any measure to be passed affecting the rights of any community or the county as a whole that was not referred to all the people through the ballot box. I am sure that in my few remarks at Jasper on the day of the convention, that I made myself perfectly clear upon that point, but I say to you now that under no conditions or circumstances will I permit any bill affecting any community, or Marion county as a whole, that is not referred to a direct vote of all its citizens to be passed while I am a member of the legislature. No fair man could ask me to do more. I most positively state that if I am your representative the people shall have a voice on all questions, and that voice will be by the use of a vote.
 "As Mr. Wilson did not qualify for the April primary, I being the only candidate to qualify there will be no primary. The rules of the primary provides that should there not be more than one qualify then the Primary Board shall declare the person qualifying to be the choice of Marion County. I have complied with the rules of the primary plan.

SEQUACHEE WATER WORKS.
 RESIDENTS of Sequachee have all the privileges in connection with water service equal to any first-class city. The supply is taken from Cumberland Mountain from springs 350 feet in elevation. Three miles of pipe are now laid.
