DEMOCRATS NOMINATE

John A. Hoge to Make Race for Trustee.

M. F. Jackson Nominated for Sheriff.

A. L. Smith For Office of Tax Assessor.

The Democratic Executive Committee of Marion county met in harmonious convention Saturday at Jasper and nominated John A. Hoge for Trustee, M. F. Jackson for Sheriff, and A. L. Smith, of Montague, for tax assessor. The utmost harmony prevailed, members of the two executive committees working in unison.

The meeting was called to order at 1 p. m. in the court room, by A. T. Stewart, chairman of the Executive Committee. G. Q. Milwee was secretary.

On motion of J. L. Seay, it was decided that members of both executive committees participate in the nomination of candidates, for which the convention was called.

On motion of J. L. Shirley, secretary Milwee read the roll of executive committee members.

On motion of J. L. Shirley, all aspirants for the offices of trustee, sheriff or tax assessor were asked to file their applications at once with the chairman, also that secret ballots be made and taken up by tellers to be appointed by Chairman.

Discussion was made over propriety of voting for other candidates than those filing applications. This was left open, and committee members allowed to vote for any man they pleased, whether present or not.

The chairman appointed Hugh Jones, T. S. Turner and Mat Griffith, tellers. On motion of J. L. Shirley the nomination of trustee was taken up. There were three candidates: S. B. Gidger, W. J. J. Hoge and John A. Hoge.

On a second roll call 46 votes were found to be in the convention, and the vote resulted as follows: John A. Hoge, 30; D. C. Kelly, 5; D. E. Hall, 5; W. J. J. Hoge, 1.

John A. Hoge's majority was 15, and on motion the nomination was made unanimous.

There was only one candidate for tax assessor, A. L. Smith, of Montague, and this was made a unanimous nomination by viva voce vote.

On nomination for sheriff, there were four applicants: John Hankins, G. C. Deakins, M. F. Jackson, W. J. Lewis. Two votes were taken, the first resulting thus: Jackson 19; Deakins, 11; Lewis 11, and Hankins 5.

By a previous ruling of convention Mr. Hankins name was dropped, and the other three voted on in a second ballot, which resulted as follows: Jackson 26; Lewis, 13; Deakins, 8.

Mr. Jackson had a majority of 6, and the nomination was made unanimous.

The democrats then had a sort of love feast. One man told how Richard City democrats had organized a Democratic Club to win out in the campaign. The Chairman was empowered to name a finance committee to raise funds, and the meeting adjourned.

WHITWELL MAN KILLED IN ILLINOIS

WHITWELL, April 11.—The body of Cleo Smith was brought to Whitwell Wednesday of last week from Illinois, where he had been killed in a saloon row. It seems from reports that he was in the saloon when a deputy sheriff with whom he had been previously involved in trouble, entered. The strife between the two men was renewed, and a fight started which ended in Smith killing the deputy. The Chief of Police of the town had been summoned, and attempted to arrest Smith, but Smith opened fire on the officer, who returned the shots, one of them killing him instantly. The body was brought to Whitwell for interment where Smith has many friends and relatives. He was married and leaves a widow. Smith was one of twin brothers. Both brothers went to Illinois to work in the mines, and by a coincidence both were killed in the same state, the other brother, Lee Smith, being killed about two years ago by the fall of a cage in a mine shaft.

PLAIN TALK FROM A REPUBLICAN

We have them right where we want them. We can elect our ticket in August." Mr. Rogers, you and the chairman have just let the Democrats make a cat's paw out of you. I always thought well of you, but to think Pat Reese, a poor boy, had to be treated the way you fellows did to beat him out of the race. Then say you did not do it. You ought to be ashamed to let people pull the wool over your eyes that way. You are smart enough to know that a house divided that way cannot stand. The secretary did his duty for the party and counted the republican vote as the call was, and found Kelly, Brewer, and Alder to have the most Republican votes, and declared them the nominees of the republican party, which was right. I was not for all of them, but am now their comrade. These fellows know the democrats laugh in their sleeves to get to vote in a Republican primary. They know that will tear the party up and give them a chance to get their men in. There will not any democrat vote for them in August. It is just their salad to get us tore up. I think it would be better to have democrat officers than to have men in that had rather tear the party up rather than get beat in a primary. They know they were not the choice of the Republicans or they would have got the more Republican votes than the other men. I am an old man, 69 years old, that has long been a republican. I don't claim voting in August for Rogers and Coppinger would be voting the Republican ticket. I like lots of others, say they were nominated by democrats and not by republicans.


