FRANK E. BROWN DIES SUDDENLY

Father of Mrs. Bushelman
Meets Death at Home of
Daughter.

Frank E. Brown, father of Mrs. J. F. Bushelman died Friday afternoon, about 2:30 o'clock after a short illness. He was apparently in good health Monday, but that night was seized with an illness which terminated fatally and the end came very suddenly Friday afternoon. It is thought that an attack of influenza which he suffered in the fall had weakened his heart and was the indirect cause of his death. Interment was made in Owen cemetery Saturday afternoon about 4:30 after brief services at the house by Rev. E. R. Lewis, pastor of the M. E. Church, south.

He is survived by the following children: Allen Brown, of Colliwood, Ala., Mrs. Albert Christian, of Washington, Ark., Mrs. Gretta Weatherbee, of Nashville, and Mrs. J. F. Bushelman, of this city. His wife died many years ago and is buried out west.

Mr. Brown was born in Concord, N. H., July 31, 1848, and was therefore in his 71st year. He had been engaged in the lumber business for a number of years and had traveled very extensively. He had been making his home with his daughter for sometime, and when the family moved here from East Lake last summer, came with them.

Was Born In Slavery

Mrs. Hester M. Griffith, colored, died at Cedar Springs Jan. 6 of influenza, aged 66 years. She was one of the few old people of the colored race yet living in Marion county, who were born in slavery, as she was born on a plantation in Middle Tennessee in 1851. She leaves an aged husband and one son, J. H. Griffith, principal of the Whitwell Public School, who is the surviving child of a family of five. Interment was made near Cedar Springs where the family have a burial lot. Her funeral services will be preached on first Sunday in May by Revs. A. G. Jones and E. Lollis, of the Primitive Baptist church. The family took its name from Amos L. Griffith, one of the pioneers of this section, but long since dead. Her husband though 70 years old, is pastor of Belmont Church of Primitive Baptists near Cedar Springs and still conducts services.

John Scheidegger Makes Statement Regarding His Candidacy as Well As Regarding Erroneous Statement.

TO THE VOTERS OF MARION COUNTY

The time being so short in which to make a campaign for Floater, I ask the privilege of a hearing thru the press of your county as it seems that two of my opponents have got busy writing about themselves.

One of my opponents, J. D. Luna, appears to be running on his good looks, superior intellect, and some kind of a personal endorsement.

As to the "looks" none of us would stand much show for the blue ribbon in a beauty contest. As to his superior intellect, qualifications and "moral" standing, I am reminded of the old adage that "self praise is half scandle," and it would be more becoming in any of us to allow some one else to say along these lines. As to his endorsement that he publishes in the papers of Marion county, I have nothing to say. If any man in the race could not go to the bat with that many people for him he certainly would be a weak brother. I don't know how many really signed the endorsement. I have not mentioned the matter to a single one of them, but the Home Bank whose name appears voluntarily denied signing same and their letter appears in this issue. Another signature is the Sprague Dairy Co. I emphatically state that there is no such firm in Franklin county. You may take a search light, a spy glass and Pinkerton's detectives and if such can be found I will pay the cost together with a liberal reward.

I am utterly astonished to see this "good" man who would "stoop" to nothing resorting to such "manly" and "fair" methods. If the Marion county papers had a circulation in Franklin county, there might be other denials as that of the Home Bank. Mr. Alexander of the Home Bank gets the news thru the local paper here as I understand I know some who are for Luna's endorsement are for me.

Now as to Bro. Travis. One would think from his articles in the Marion county papers he takes himself seriously. He says that my statement that I would oppose the abolition of the 18th Judicial Circuit is "camouflage" and that I have stolen his thunder. Now if Bro. Travis will find one single man worthy of belief in Franklin county or elsewhere who will say that I have by word or act directly or indirectly, said or intimated that I am for its abolition I will immediately quit the race. As to his "thunder" he has none except what is furnished him, as he says, by "who is behind him." Yes, I know who is behind him, but it would not interest anyone very much. He says he didn't know that there was a move on foot to bond Franklin and Marion counties to complete the Dixie Highway. I am sure he didn't know it, but if he were accustomed to reading the Chattanooga papers he would know it as well as the balance of us do. Those who are "behind him" as he puts it, well know

this fact and that is the reason they "are behind him." He says he drove me to the position of not abolishing the circuit. I have never been driven to anything. No one in this county that I have ever heard speak is "cutting up" about the circuit. This is no issue. It was simply raised by these Dixie Highway fellows who "are behind him" for the purpose of misleading, if possible, the people of Marion county. He says he was the first to make his announcement. Well, if that is true, the Scripture will again be fulfilled where it says "the first shall be last."

I have announced on a declaration of principles. I shall stand there. I have misrepresented no one, neither have I misrepresented anyone or any fact. I will carry both counties. I am sure. When I go, to Nashville I want the people to feel free to communicate freely with me on all subjects in which they are interested. I assure you I will appreciate your suffrage.
