About the only business attended to was the appointment of delegates to the division institute which meets in Jackson the first of September. The annual county institute and field day will be held in this city on October 25 and farmers thruout the county are invited to have exhibits of their animals and farm products here on that day.

J. A. Winfrey Jr. began work on the bridges on the Covington levee a mile north of Somerville on Monday morning and indications from the progress of the work are that these bridges will be completed and ready for use by the end of the week. This is a much needed improvement, the old bridges having been in use for so many years that they have been in a dangerous condition for some time. They have been repaired until repair was impossible, and the public who travel that road will be glad that the new bridges are being built.

The high prices on seed of winter cover crops are likely to interfere with the planting of a large acreage this year. Clovers, vetch, and all fallgrains are much higher than in former years and this fact may deter some from planting. This should not be the case, for every possible acre should be covered during the winter by some winter growing crop. The clovers and vetch are among the legumes and are best, but rye, oats, wheat or any winter growing plant will take up the available plant food in winter and will hold lards that would be subject to washing without them. We want to see large areas of these things grown on Fayette county farms.

registration in the eighth district. In the first there were almost two hundred voters registered, leaving about seventy five white voters in the district who have not registered. They will have an opportunity just before the next regular election when the registration books will be open for three days. In the fourth district the registration during the ten days was rather light, and there were more than the average number of negroes to register in that district, too.

A matter of interest to wheat growers in this vicinity recently was that R. W. Sessums, who owns the water mill just north of town on the Jackson road, has ordered a new flouring mill and will have same installed at an early date. Many farmers in the county would have been growing at least enough wheat to make their own flour had there been any convenient place for getting it ground. The new mill, when installed, will make a high grade of flour, according to the manufacturers, and being convenient to farmers of this vicinity, should serve to increase very largely the amount of wheat grown here. Whether wheat can be profitably grown for market or not, it certainly can be profitably grown for one's own bread supply.

Work was begun this week by L. F. Catron on the building of a large concrete silo on his farm a few miles north of Somerville. The work is being done by Winston Harris of this city, concrete contractor. This is the second concrete silo on the Catron farm, the first having been built two years ago and having proven highly satisfactory and profitable. Mr. Catron fed last winter one of the very best herds of beef cattle ever fed in this county and made a splendid profit on them, and he believes that his silo was one of the most profitable adjuncts to his successful cattle feeding. His cattle were sold in St. Louis in the spring and, along with those of some of his neighbors brought the top price on that market. It is this success that leads Mr. Catron to build a second silo.
