County Fair Directors Met Saturday.

On last Saturday as announced before the directors of the county fair met in the chancery court room and received the reports of the district soliciting committees. The total sum reported by these committees as being subscribed was in round numbers \$425, an amount that is most gratifying to every man who wants to see the fair a success. C. C. Williams from the first district draws the blue ribbon for securing the largest amount, \$220; the fourth district \$38, fifth \$25, eighth \$58.50, eleventh \$10, twelfth \$6.50, fourteenth \$60, and fifteenth \$5, with a

few scattering subscriptions that have been secured and not included here.

The committees started out to secure \$400 to \$500 for the premium lists and expenses. From the showing made Saturday there remains very little fears that the full \$500 desired will be subscribed before the lists are closed. Several districts were not represented and some of these, it is believed will make some subscription to the fund. Other districts had not been fully canvassed by the solicitors, so that there is time yet for every man in the county to make his subscription if he has not already done so. If you have not been seen by one of the solicitors from your district send your subscription direct to the secretary here in Somerville, but at any rate help the fair for it will help you if you are a citizen of Fayette county and will help the county.

A resolution was passed which places all exhibitors on an equal footing. It had been suggested that special prizes be offered to members of pig clubs, poultry clubs, corn clubs, and canning clubs, but the resolution allows them to enter in competition for any prize offered in their respective departments, but no special prize for any of these, unless the special prize be provided by friends of the club. The same resolution, also, permits all citizens of the county to compete for any prizes offered. Last year it was understood that people living in Somerville were not to compete for prizes in any line, but this year every citizen of the county may compete.

W. S. Latta, J. H. Flippin and J. W. Moffatt were appointed a committee on rules, to frame a set of rules for governing the entry, removal and handling of exhibits and the awarding of prizes. They are expected to complete the draft of rules and report them to the next meeting of the directors which will be held on Saturday May 20 in the afternoon.

Those present at Saturday's meeting had good reports to make from their respective districts as to the sentiment in favor of the fair and the good feeling for its success. Also they are enthusiastic over the plans already being start-

Board of Equalizers Announced.

Hon. W. G. Shelton, chairman of the county court, announced Wednesday the appointment of the five members of the Tax Equalization board which is to meet in this city on the first Monday in June which is on the fifth of that month. The members as announced are W. A. Rhea, W. T. Loggins, M. L. Farris, W. S. Newby and W. E. Nurremore.

All taxes are assessed this year, both real and personal property and the real estate will not again be assessed until 1918, being assessed each two years, while the personal property is assessed every year. That is, the assessments fixed this year on all real estate in the county hold good for this year and next both. Citizens who are not satisfied with the valuation placed on their property by the assessor have recourse thru the board of equalizers on June fifth and the following ten or fifteen days they are in session.

IMPROVED LIVE STOCK IN OBION COUNTY.

To Receive Big Impetus Public Meeting at Court House Monday Night, May 15th, Registered Short Horn Sale May 16th.

Those interested in improved live stock in Obion and adjoining counties will be gratified to learn that the Industrial and Immigration Division of the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis Railway has arranged with the American Short-Horn Breeders Association to conduct an auction sale of registered Short-Horns at Union City, Tuesday, May 16th., at 1:30 p. m. The sale will be conducted under the auspices of the American Short-Horn Breeders Association and the Obion County Live Stock Association. A public meeting of farmers, breeders and others interested in better live stock will be held at the court house in Union City, Monday night, May 15th., at 8 o'clock and speakers of note from St. Louis, Chicago, Nashville and elsewhere will be present to deliver addresses.

Fifty head of registered Short-Horns will be offered in the sale, consisting of about thirty bulls ready for service and thirty females. The offering will come recommended and approved by the American Short-Horn Breeders Ass'n., F. I. Dorby will be sales manager and Col. Fred Roppert, Decatur, Ind., auctioneer. This will constitute the fourth sale of registered Short-Horn cattle consigned by the American Short-Horn Breeders Association to Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis Railway territory within the past thirty days and it is hoped that breeders from Henderson, Henry, Madison, Carroll and other counties in this division of the State will attend prepared to purchase, as two of the sales mentioned were held at Paris and Lexington.

In order to encourage a large attendance at the sale, the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis Railway has agreed to grant approximately half passenger fares from points on its lines west of Nashville to Union City and return; it has also agreed to transport cattle sold at the sale to points on its lines in Tennessee at one fourth of the regular rates.
