Election Ordered for Aug. 3.

We, the election commissioners for Fayette county, State of Tennessee, hereby order that an election be held in the several voting precincts of Fayette county within legal hours on August 3, 1916, for the purpose of electing a county trustee, a sheriff, a register, a tax assessor, an attorney-general, five members of the county board of education, and in each district a constable and three members of the advisory board.

And by the authority vested in us by a special act of the legislature and under a proclamation of the governor under said act we order to be held on August 3, 1916 in every voting precinct in this county a special election to determine whether or not there shall be held under the provisions of said special act a constitutional convention for the state of Tennessee.

And we hereby appoint the following officers, judges and clerks to serve in said elections, the same officers and judges to serve in the general and special elections, but using a separate ballot box and ballots for the two elections.
