ACTUAL RESULTS OF BETTER FARMING TO BE SEEN AT THE TRI-STATE FAIR

Educational Section Will Be Important Feature of the Agricultural Department

Two large buildings, affording double space of former years, will be used this year to house the exhibits in the Agricultural Department of the Tri-State Fair at Memphis, Tenn., Sept. 25 to Oct. 3.

The exhibits this year will show the actual results of the better farming methods that are being employed so successfully in Arkansas, Mississippi and Tennessee.

County displays from the tri-states will form one of the most interesting parts of the agricultural exhibits. Owing to the keener interest that has been awakened in better farming, the number of county displays this year will be three times greater than ever before.

Premiums offered for the best county displays are as follows: First, \$200; second, \$150; third, \$100; fourth, \$50; fifth, \$60, and sixth, \$40. Each additional county making a creditable display will be paid \$30, which should cover the cost of putting up the exhibit.

In addition to these premiums, special prizes of \$25 each will be awarded for the best exhibits from Tennessee, Arkansas and Mississippi. As an inducement to have all exhibits in place when the fair opens, a special prize of \$25 has been offered to the county whose exhibit shall be ready first.

Another special prize of \$25 is offered to the county whose special feature attracts the greatest attention. There is no limit as to what the special feature may be. It may be educational in scope; it may be special decorative designs, or it may be an attractive display of some one special product, the arrangement of that product, the general arrangement of the entire exhibit, or some novelty feature. It must pertain to agriculture.

A special feature of the Agricultural Department will be an educational

section to be conducted by Prof. H. M. Cottrell, manager and agriculturist of the farm development bureau of the Memphis Business Men's Club Chamber of Commerce.

The United States Department of Agriculture, the State Agricultural Colleges of Tennessee, Arkansas and Mississippi, and various other agencies have been invited to co-operate in making the educational section of real service to the farmers.

Prof. Cottrell will give daily demonstrations of inoculation of crimson clover seed, bolting bur clover seed, treating oats for smut, selecting corn and cotton seed. In short, he will demonstrate so-called scientific farming methods to show what simple operations they really are when stripped of their high-sounding verbiage.

Miniature model farms will be exhibited in the Agricultural Buildings to give farmers new ideas as to how buildings should be arranged to best advantage on the farms. How to control soil washing, show practical succession of crops, etc.

In connection with the Agricultural Department will be the greatest display of farm implements ever arranged at the Tri-State Fair. Nearly every Memphis dealer in agricultural implements has reserved space for this display and will show a complete line of goods, while many out of town firms will also be represented.

Farmers who contemplate purchases would do well to bear in mind the implement display at the Tri-State Fair. Every kind of machine will be seen in actual operation. A large tract of ground has been reserved for the demonstration of tractors, the fair has purchased a large amount of wheat to be threshed on the ground, and several crops have been planted on the fair grounds for the various silo machines which will give daily demonstrations.

FAIR TO HAVE REST ROOM

Wearry Sightseers Will Be Entertained With Concerts At Memphis.

Restful chairs and benches will be strewn throughout the women's building during the Tri-State Fair. These fair visitors will be welcome to rest from the strenuous task of seeing this wonderful Southern exposition. An orchestra will play daily in the women's building, and there will be numerous other unusual features to make visitors feel at home.

CLUBS TO HAVE EXHIBIT

Women of Rural Communities to Show Results of Co-Operation At Tri-State Fair.

Unusual interest has been created in the Community Club exhibits which will be housed in the women's building at the Tri-State Fair. Miss Bessie R. Murphy, director of the women's department of the Memphis Bureau of Farm Development, will have charge of this section. City women will be surprised to learn what these rural clubs have accomplished.

A Note from Rev. G. W. Wilson.

We are told of a suggestive idea and interesting experience of some leading laymen in a congregation of the Protestant Episcopal church in New York.

They concluded that people would be more interested in the church if they were doing Christian service. To quiet indifferent and inactive men, who thought they were too busy to serve on committees or speak in meetings, they asked them to do an easy service. They were to listen with care to the sermon on Sunday, and write down any point made by the preacher, which caused them to change their manner of living, or to feel that they should be better men. Then their part was to tell that point to some other person during the week. When they might meet a man to whom they wished to tell the helpful truth, they were not to give it as coming from the minister, nor present it as if delivering an exhortation, but with friendly interest, advocate the gospel truth, which had so favorably impressed themselves.

These men have gone out with the message all over the city, and have become most interesting conversationalists and enthusiastic workers. They have become ambassadors of the Truth in clubs, shops, offices, on streets, anywhere convenient; and through them the preacher is speaking to more hearers each week than ever gather in the church.

Church members should be faithful to their order. Christians should, by example and precept, with increasing interest and effort advocate the teachings of their religious belief.

MANAGEMENT OF THE BULL.

(By C. D. Lowe, Division of Extension, University of Tennessee.)

The ownership of the best bulls in the world would be disastrous to Tennessee farmers, if they persist in the present methods of the majority in handling them.

It is more often the rule than the exception to see creditable bulls running in pastures with from 25 to 100 females. Such practices can not be too harshly condemned. The results are too well known to be recorded; however, the tendency to end such a system is not evident.

Young bulls are ruined for breeding, really before they have a chance to show their worth, and older bulls are given an opportunity to show traits termed "rogueishness" that end in their consignment to the block before their real period of usefulness is ended. There is no good reason why the service of a good bull can not be doubled or tripled over that usually obtained, by properly conserving his powers and using him in different herds or communities, when such is necessary to prevent inbreeding.

There is only one proper place for a bull and that is in a properly constructed and arranged lot or paddock where there is water, shade, and room for exercise. Of course pasture is desirable, but if it is necessary to feed the bull the year around, it will be a paying proposition when the usefulness of a really good bull is at stake.

Arrangements can easily be made to facilitate the introduction into the lot of females for breeding, by the placing of gates—allow only one complete service, as experience has shown that it is as sure as a doren.

If the bull is at all vicious, it is advisable to have a strong wire running overhead the length of his enclosure. On this wire place an iron ring, to which tie a wire or rope connecting with a ring in the bull's nose. By this method there is no interference with exercise and it will not be necessary to unfasten the bull for service.
