Millions For Farmers

I believe the federal reserve act was the greatest piece of constructive legislation in the history of our nation up to the time of the passage of the federal farm loan act. But it scarcely reached the farmer except in that it relieved the entire country of periodical panics. The federal farm loan act will benefit 10 people where the reserve act has benefited one. This is especially true in the South, where the farmers are paying a higher rate of interest than in almost any other part of the country.

The act will revolutionize the agriculture of our country. When one realizes that it has made 40 billions of dollars' worth of farm property in the United States available for long-time loan at a low rate of interest, it will be easily seen that the importance of this law cannot be overestimated.

The farmers of our nation are carry-

ing a mortgage debt of about \$8,500,000,000. The average rate on these loans is about 8 1/2 per cent. In the east and middle west it is from 5 to 6 per cent. It does not take much figuring to see how tremendously high the rate must be in the South in order to make it average 8 1/2 per cent throughout the United States.

The federal farm loan act provides for money at a rate not to exceed 6 per cent and thus the difference between 6 and 8 1/2 per cent will mean a saving to the farmers of \$162,500,000 annually. I think more than half of this amount will be saved to the farmers of the South, and could save another sum equally as large if they had 6 per cent money with which to buy supplies, instead of paying time prices.

Under the old system a farmer would borrow, we will say, \$1000 on his farm and it would cost him \$60 a year interest and the commissions. About all he has been able to do has been to pay the \$60 and save up enough to pay another commission to the loan agent in order to get his loan renewed at the expiration of the five years, and in this case he still owes the principal of \$1000. Under the new plan he can borrow \$1000 and pay \$87.19 per year, and at the end of 20 years he owes nothing, SOUTHERN FARMING


