Beat the Boll Weevil.

The boll weevil is here to stay. It is likely that in a few years it will infest all cotton growing districts. Under proper farming methods as much cotton can be raised with the boll weevil as has been produced under the old methods at any time before the pest came. In large districts where the boll weevil almost wiped out cotton 8 to 12 years ago, and has been persistent since, as much cotton is being raised now as in the best years before the weevil came. Everything necessary to do to secure good yields under the boll weevil infestation is profitable to go where there is no boll weevil. The strong weevils that live through

the winter and are the beginning of the hordes that destroy the cotton next summer are developed in the squares and feed on the tender shoots of the top growth that is made the last weeks before frost. Destroy all stalks while they are green and before frost and the weevils perish. The earlier this is done, the more weevils will be destroyed. One weevil killed in the fall may result in thousands less the following summer.

Cut the stalks with a mower and cure the hay to feed horses, mules and cattle. The leaves and finer stems make the rich hay, the stalks will be waste. Cut the stalks with a stalk cutter or hoe and plow them under to a depth of 6 to 8 inches.

Weevils live thru the winter under trash in the cotton fields, ditch banks, fence rows, turn rows and in the old bark and rubbish around stumps, clumps of trees and the timber. Clean up these places.

Save seed of early fruiting varieties now before it is shipped away. The boll weevil does not do serious damage until August and a variety that fruits heavily in July will give a profitable yield in spite of severe boll weevil infestation.

An early fruiting variety yielded this year at the Experiment Station, Stoneville, Mississippi, where the weevil was abundant, 2,200 pounds seed cotton per acre, while in the same field, ordinary late fruiting varieties produced 500 pounds seed cotton an acre. Local Pastor Dies at Memphis Hospital

After many months of suffering which made it impossible for him to attend his duties for several months as pastor of the Methodist church in Somerville, Rev. G. W. Wilson on Wednesday morning passed to the great beyond, death coming while he was in a Memphis hospital following an operation for gall stones which was performed several days before.

Deceased has been in the work of the ministry within the Memphis conference all his life, having served during those years some of its most important charges. He came to Somerville at the beginning of the present conference year last November and during the spring was forced because of his health to give up his work and go in search of relief. He spent many months away, returned some weeks ago but little improved. A week ago he went to Memphis and on Thursday of last week underwent the operation from which he died on Wednesday morning. During the months of his active ministry here he endeared himself to his congregation by his enthusiastic and consecrated service and his death has occasioned serious regret among the members of his congregation. He was particularly energetic in the plans and work of building the new church edifice which is now nearing completion and which will reflect much credit upon him as the pastor in charge and upon the congregation when completed.

The remains were carried Thursday over the L. & N. Railway to Martin, Tennessee, where burial took place that day.

Deceased leaves his wife and three children, Austin and Willis, two grown sons, and a married daughter who lives at Martin.
