Circuit Court In Session.

The Circuit Court for Fayette county convened on Monday morning with Judge S. J. Everett presiding and Clerk M. R. Henley, Sheriff J. T. Jordan, and Gen. Nat Tipton at their places for the term's work. The grand jury is composed of the following: T. H. Griffin foreman, W. D. Blaydes, June Walker, Arthur Doyle, John Robins, J. E. Butts, P. H. Downey, J. W. Bailey, C. E. Willbourne, J. G. Hendon, Will Maloan and Crawford Blaylock, Officer W. S. Newby.

The civil docket being light was completed before the closing hours on Tuesday and the criminal docket was begun on Wednesday morning. The Falcon is informed, tho not by any one with authority so to state, that court will adjourn on Thursday for the Thanksgiving holiday, and this has long been the custom of the court, and will resume its work on Friday and continue until the close of the present week and likely into next week.

The docket is of the ordinary kind with few things of interest those not connected directly with them.

The County Agent

J. W. Moffatt who has been serving this county for the past three years as demonstration agent is preparing to move his family the latter part of the week to Ripley where he will go as agent for Lauderdale county for the year 1917. Mr. Moffatt will be here most of the time until the end of the present year to wind up his work in this county. It is with serious regret that The Falcon chronicles Mr. Moffatt's departure from Fayette county. He has certainly been a most active and effective worker among the demonstrators of the county and has wrought much good among them. In his new field in Lauderdale county we shall expect to hear of great things he has accomplished. His departure from here does not mean the cessation of the work in this county. The plan for another agent will be taken up and pushed and the county court will be asked to make the \$500 appropriation just as if there were no change in agents, and as soon as plans for paying the salary are made the U. S. Department of Agriculture will send another man here to take the work up where Mr. Moffatt leaves off.

We need a greater co-operative spirit in the work of this county than there has been. There has been some criticism, and without attempting to say whether it was just or unjust, we do say that the work would have resulted in more good for our people if this criticism had been left off and every citizen had joined in an effort to help the agent do effective and beneficial work. When a new agent is installed in Mr. Moffatt's place if every citizen will join hands with him to help make the county richer and better and make farming here more profitable Fayette county will continue to develop and to prosper and even to increase her riches and prosperity.

TENNESSEE CORN, GROWN BY BOYS—NONE BETTER

EDUCATIONAL.

To one imbued with a love of country and community there is nothing of more vital interest than our public school. It is the one source to which we can look for a betterment of our citizenship. From the walls of the school room must come the future homemakers of our country. Whosoever, therefore, stands in the way of educational progress is a hindrance to his community and an enemy to his country.

Our educational system, it is freely admitted, is far from perfect. Questionable and conflicting laws are upon our statute books. A period of transition is upon us. Our secondary schools have served their purpose and are giving place to the High School. Modern educational ideals are forcing a change in our course and our grading. The teacher who stands at the head of his profession must no longer be the individual who is simply versed in a little "Book Learning" and has no practical knowledge beside. He must be a wide awake, alert, practical man who is at home on the farm, in the shop, or in the great laboratory of Nature about us. Not only this but he must have the ability for moral training. The ancient rule of iron by which children were forced to render a form of obedience not because it was right but because of the fear of punishment has given way to the principle that we do right. The child who in the formative period has not had instilled in him the love of truth and morality has been wronged and when later the hand of the law is laid upon him it should not be regarded as wholly the result of his natural viciousness but as a result of his training or the lack of it.

Whatever the form of discouragement the teacher may labor, he should always remember the nobility of his calling. Maledictions may be heaped upon our heads, unjust criticisms may be our portions, but none of these things should move us. We must cultivate an abiding faith in the power of truth to prevail over error. Let us spend a little time trying to find out what others do or think or say but let us look ever at the purity of our own motives and be sincere and conscientious and the results will take care of themselves.

One-Cent Letter Rate Postage.

Washington, Nov. 30. The ways are now being prepared for the launching of the movement for the readjustment of postal rates in the next session of Congress. This problem was to have been taken up in the last session but had to be deferred on account of the consideration by railway mail pay. Since this has been disposed of the committees are prepared to take up the matter of placing the various postal rates on a more equitable basis.

A zone system of rates for second class matter is being prominently urged to take the place of the present flat rate which was adopted nearly forty years ago. The present rate has for some time been regarded as a discrimination against the newspapers in favor of the great national magazines. Like the parcel post the proposed zone rates would be based on the length of the haul.

The postal committees have been besieged by petitions bearing millions of names and several hundred thousand letters from individuals urging a readjustment of postal rates with a view of making possible one cent letter postage. A survey of the situation indicates that sufficient changes will be made in the various rates to permit the granting of a 1 cent rate on local delivery letters in the next session of Congress.

Chairman Moon of the House Postal Committee, today said: "I think that the Committee will take up this second-class mail matter at the next session and press it to a conclusion at once. While I cannot speak for the Committee, this is my desire in the matter. I do not know what kind of bill we will pass, whether it will have a zone feature attached to it or not. This view has been presented frequently in years past, and sometimes not. As to what shape the legislation will be in I am not able to say, but I am sure the committee will give it the best possible shape in the public interest."

Congressman Austin, of Tenn., said: "If the leaders of Congress would give its members an opportunity to vote on the proposition the American people would be given a general 1 cent letter postage without further delay. There is no reason why any person mailing a letter should be forced to pay a tax of one cent of every two paid, the estimated profit to the Government for handling a letter."

Congressman McKellar of Tennessee, said: "All past reduction in the rate of first class postage have resulted in tremendous increases in the volume of mail. The demand for such a change in the rate seems universal and I am sure the Congress would be justified in taking early action in the matter."

Commenting on the matter Representative Abernethy, of Ala., said: "The post office department was created to offer the very best possible service to the public at a minimum cost and is not supposed to produce any more revenue than is actually needed to pay the running expense. Legislation needed to create a 1 cent rate on drop letters

should be passed without further delay; it will cost the Government no money and it will act as a much needed stimulant to business."

Congressman Wingo, of Ark., takes the stand that postage rates should be fixed more in accord with what it actually costs the Government to perform the service, and such being the condition he says "there is no sound argument against fixing the local letter rate at 1 cent per ounce."

C. K. Taylor Dead

Fayette county lost one of her best and most esteemed citizens on last Thursday evening when C. K. Taylor aged 52, died at his home at Taylor's Chapel in the north end of the county, when just in the prime of his life.
