An Unsolved Mystery

All during the cold weather of the past ten days the city water has given out in the early morning of almost every day. It is stated by those in charge of the water department of the city that the tank is filled each night just before midnight when the plant shuts down. And the secret of the matter seems to be that users of water are wasting the supply by leaving, each night, their hydrants running so as to keep them from freezing. Each hydrant will waste in this way during the night much more water than would be used from the same hydrant during the day, and hence people who try to comply with the rules of the water plant are put to untold inconvenience by those who are wasting the city's supply.

It will be remembered that last winter the water department was forced to cut the water off at the powerhouse every night because of this practice and compel every body to do without water until some one could go to the powerhouse next morning and turn the water on. Those who rose early each morning were thereby caused much annoyance by having to get up and get breakfast and attend to other morning duties before the water was turned on. All of these inconveniences could be avoided if every user of city water will turn his hydrants off each night, cut the water off under ground at cut-off made for that purpose and not force the water department to cut off the supply at the powerhouse, thereby putting all who want water in the early morning to an inconvenience. By no means should the water be cut off at night in this way, for people are dependent upon it for every purpose, and we've heard of cases of sickness when water was cut off at the powerhouse where parties were forced to seek cisterns or wells in distant parts of town to get water for the sick, and in one case of fire during last winter much trouble was caused by not having a supply of water to fight it. But the city water department is helpless unless people will quit the useless waste mentioned above, for with this waste the supply will be exhausted any way, and those who need water will be as badly inconvenienced in this way as if the department is forced to cut off the supply at the powerhouse. **THINK OF YOUR NEIGHBOR BEFORE YOU TURN YOUR HYDRANT ON AT NIGHT TO WASTE THE SUPPLY.**

County Court January 2

The next session of the quarterly court of Fayette county will convene in this city on Tuesday, 2, 1917. At that time some of the questions to be settled by the court are mentioned below.

The annual election of the chairman is always one of the first questions to be taken up at the January meeting. So far as has been learned there will be but one name to go before the court for this important office, that name being the present chairman, W. G. Shelton. He has been chairman of the court about two years and has been careful and conservative in handling the county finances, and has made one of the best presiding officers ever wielding the gavel in that important body.

A county superintendent of schools will be elected to succeed Supt. D. K. Donnell who has served efficiently for fourteen years, and who announced when elected two years ago that at this time he would retire from office. Following that announcement he is not a candidate for the next term. At this time there appears but one candidate in the race for this office, W. T. Loggins, of Somerville, earlier in the year Prof. W. R. Seay of Braden and Prof. J. B. Summers of this city both announced candidates. Prof. Seay withdrew from the race before the first of October at which time the examination for license to enter this race was to be held and did not take the examination. Prof. Summers took three days examination but was taken sick during the work and was unable to take the examination on one of the four days set apart for that work and so, under the rules of the state board of education, was not able to obtain the necessary certificate of qualification. W. T. Loggins took the examination in 1901 and secured a grade that entitled him to a permanent certificate of qualification. A few weeks ago the question of his certificate remaining in force after he quit teaching was raised by some one and at his request the matter was taken up by the state board of education and by them referred to the attorney-general of the state at Nashville who held his certificate good and still in force, this being given to the state superintendent in an official opinion rendered a few days ago. This condition leaves no candidate in the race for this office except W. T. Loggins.

There are vacancies in the high school board, workhouse board, poorhouse board etc., to be filled, but when The Falcon called at the office of County Court Clerk C. W. Crawford, he had not looked up all of these and so could not just then tell us of all these, which he will have ready to report to the court when it convenes.

Serious question has been raised by certain justices of the wisdom of continuing the workhouse another year, the reason being the enormous expense it places upon the county. But advocates of the workhouse system argue that by no other method could the county get as much on her roads as by the present system. So there is the position of the two sides, and to suggest what the court may do in this matter would be purely a guess, and The Falcon will not indulge a guess at it.

One of the most important matters the court will have to come up for consideration will be the application for appropriation for \$500 for the salary of a farm demonstration agent for next year and for \$200 for the canning club agent. The former has served the county three years and has done lots of good. The canning club agent has served but one year and the result of her work was shown at the recent county fair in fine shape. Both these are particularly valuable to the county just now at this transition period when we know we are in danger of the boll weevil and The Falcon hopes, along with hundred of other friends of better farming, that the court will grant these appropriations.

The session bids fair to a lengthy and busy one.
