Co-operative Shippers

Following is a list of farmers who contributed the second shipment of hogs from Fayette county:

Joe Williams, J. N. Clay, J. A. Smith, A. A. Smith, R. B. Young, J. A. McNeob, H. Taylor, C. Z. Franks, G. B. Baskerville, A. H. Sanders and Fred Williams. There were 111 head of hogs weighing 16680 pounds and put on St. Louis market for nine tenth cent per pound, covering entire expenses. This time the market was good as indicated by the prices received for the hogs. Only five hogs brought as low as 13 cents the others ranged from 14 to 19 cents. To give you an idea of what these hogs did I might say Joe Williams sold 33 head, 20 of which weighed 1550 pounds and others from 130 to 200 pounds for \$36.59, J. N. Clay sold 8 for \$269.41, A. A. Smith 14 for \$425.77, and G. B. Baskerville 17 for \$57.01 after all expenses were deducted. Entire load brought \$2678.30.

There was never a better time to begin to grow live stock than now and those who have any hogs or cattle on hand and desire to ship can always get rid of your stock through the co-operative shipping. Another car of hogs will be shipped Wednesday, March 26. Those who have not listed hogs and desire to ship on that day can do so by listing your hogs with the county agent. This may be done by dropping him a card stating the number of hogs and the approximate weights. Remember this must be done several days in advance. Already there has been 85 head listed for next week.

Sweet Potato Growers Or- ganize

Twenty five or thirty of the most progressive farmers in the Oakland community met in Oakland, Saturday afternoon March 15 for the purpose of organizing a Sweet Potato Grower's Association. The meeting was presided over by A. A. Smith who called the meeting. Mr. Smith made a very interesting talk briefly explaining the object of the meeting. He also had a bushel potato crate filled with potatoes showing the audience just how to pack the potatoes in order that those who buy might be able to give the most for them.

A the request of those who called the meeting W. A. Owens, county agent, was present and briefly outlined the things essential to an organization of this kind. Mr. Owens pointed out the fact that C. W. Reeves and A. A. Smith sold more than three hundred bushels a few days ago for \$1.80 per bushel. He stated also that this crop would take the place of cotton if judiciously handled. The people were urged to build plenty of houses to protect the potatoes in order that they might hold them for the right time to put on the market.

Following is a list of those who agreed to plant potatoes and also the acreage: C. W. Reeves 5 acres, A. A. Smith 4, Jesse and Joe Bradsher 3, W. N. McFadden 3, J. N. Clay, Q. E. Laferty 1, Lee Pierce 1, C. W. Irwin 1, H. H. Robinson 1, A. L. Taylor, H. Morrow 1, E. P. Hopper 1, J. P. Matthews 1, R. D. Griffin 1. In all 234 acres were pledged to be grown. What other community will be next?

Mass Meeting Saturday

The Falcon has been authorized to announce that a mass meeting of all citizens of the county will be held at the court house Saturday afternoon, March 22, to discuss the proposed amendment to the highway laws, by which a tax will be levied on each buggy and wagon used in the county. Every citizen is invited to the mass meeting, whether he favors or opposes the tax levied. Senator Summers and Representative Wells will base their action on the bill to the result of the mass meeting. It is, therefore, desired to have the mass meeting representative of all interests and sections of the county.

The present plan seems to be to have a draft of the amendment ready to present to the mass meeting for discussion. Then such changes as are favored by a majority of those present can be made, the final draft of the law made and forwarded to Nashville for passage if the mass meeting so instructs.

A great many expressions have been heard in the past week from substantial citizens in every part of the county in regard to the new measure and sentiment appears practically unanimous, it is one to judge from these expressions. The new measure will place a part of the highway burden on a population that has never borne any in the past, as they have buggies and wagons, but the sum total of all personality is less than the \$1000 exemption, so that they pay no tax at all. And a large per cent of the population of the county is included in this number.

An appeal is made throughout the county to come to this mass meeting and help to put over the amendment and increase the highway funds in a substantial amount from sources, most of which are not now bearing any part of the expense of building and keeping up the roads.

Poultry Clubs

How many boys and girls in Fayette county would like to get a great deal of pleasure, some valuable information and, at the same time enter into a paying business of his or her own? You can get all this by joining the Boys' and Girls' Poultry Clubs.

It is time to begin now. Hatching should be completed by the last of April. Early hatched pullets mean fall and winter layers. Old hens do not lay until spring, neither do May and June hatched pullets. Then poultry specialists tell us that the early hatched chicks bring much better than those taken off in May, June and the later months.

Those who wish to do first year work set 45 eggs or buy 30 day-old chicks. Second year members keep 8 or more pullets or hens for breeding with one selected male. The third year members take charge of the home flock. We are also anxious to have as many adult members as is possible, men and women who will endeavor to improve the flock they already have by taking advantage of the suggestions offered by the Division of Extension and who will in any other way help to make the farm flock a paying proposition. The adult members will also be a worthy source of encouragement and assistance to the junior members in their club projects.

Since it is impossible to cover the county in the limited time and to talk all his over with the teachers, pupils and parents, will not every one who is interested mail name and address to the county home demonstration agent, who will in turn forward the name to Knoxville, from which place interesting and instructive letters will be sent regularly to each club member. Literature and help will also be given by the county agent.

Let's begin right by getting a large enrollment of juniors and adults and then keep right by following directions. Together we can make poultry pay in Fayette county.
