LIME NEEDED IN TENNESSEE

Soils Seriously Deficient In This Element According To Experts In Conference

FINELY GROUND LIMESTONE

Two Tons of Ground Limestone to the Acre is Recommendation—Made—Some Farmers Use Heavier Application Than This With Profit, Especially for Legumes.

At a meeting of representatives of various experiment stations from the southeastern states, at Knoxville, Tennessee, April 29-30, the question of the use of lime on soils of Tennessee was considered.

The agreement was unanimous that the soils of the southeastern states are seriously deficient in lime, so that liming is essential to their most profitable development and permanent improvement.

Suitable agricultural lime materials are high calcium, magnesium and dolomitic limestone; also high grade oyster shells and marl, together with the burnt products (or the chemical equivalent of such) of any of these in the amounts recommended.

The finer the limestone is ground, the greater is its immediate availability. Limestone ground to pass thru a ten-mesh screen, all finer particles included, is recommended for the common application of two tons per acre. Either very finely pulverized limestone or burnt lime is recommended, where an application of only a few hundred pounds per acre is to be made.

For general use an application of 1 to 2 tons of ground limestone per acre, or one-half that amount of burnt lime, once in rotation of not more than five years was recommended. For alfalfa and permanent pasture, an initial application of double these amounts should be made.

Lime may safely be used at any point in the ordinary farm rotation without serious loss of the material. If applied in connection with tilled crops, its mixture with the soil will be insured. The effects of lime are likely to be in proportion to the thoroughness with which it is mixed with the soil in which the crop roots develop.

Liming is most profitable in those rotations in which legumes are prominent; but, over large areas in these states, especially on the heavier types of soil, liming is profitable for corn, small grains, and grasses.

With soils poor in potash and phosphate, liming gives best results only when supplemented by materials carrying these constituents.

Chapter 575, Senate Bill No. 1006

(BY SUMMERS)

An Act to provide and regulate the compensation of Chancery Court Clerks and Masters in all counties of the State of Tennessee, having a population of not less than thirty thousand two hundred and fifty (30,250) nor more than thirty thousand two hundred and sixty (30,260) by the Federal Census of 1910 or any subsequent Federal Census.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Tennessee, That the Chancery Court Clerks and Masters of all the counties in the State of Tennessee having a population of not less than thirty thousand two hundred and fifty (30,250) nor more than thirty thousand two hundred and sixty (30,260) by the Federal Census of 1910, or any subsequent Federal Census shall receive the sum of one thousand dollars (1,000.00) as salaries per annum; provided, that said Chancery Court Clerks and Masters shall file annually an itemized statement, sworn to, with the County Judge or Chairman of the County Court of said counties showing the amount paid into their respective offices, fees of the preceding year, and in all such counties where the total amount of fees fail to equal the salary hereinabove provided, the difference between the amount of such fees and said salary for each particular Clerk and Master in such counties shall be paid to the Clerks and Masters upon a warrant drawn by the County Judge or Chairman of the County Court out of the County Treasury.

Section 2. Be it further enacted, That if the total amount of such fees exceed the salary set out and regulated in Section 1 of this Act the Clerks and Masters shall be allowed to retain such excess.

Section 3. Be it further enacted, That this Act take effect from and after its passage, the public welfare requiring it.

AGED MINISTER LIKES TO GO AUTOMOBILING

Will Attend Methodist Centenary Celebration June 20-July 13.

Aged Minister to Attend Methodist Centenary Celebration.

Rev. Albert Vogel of Ganett, Pa., at the age of 102 is praying every day that his life may be spared to enable him to be present at the Methodist Centenary celebration which will be in Columbus, O., from June 20 to July 13.

Entering the ministry before the age of 25, he has occupied the pulpit for more than 80 years. In the early sixties he was pastor in Bucyrus, where he established lifelong friends. When 100 years old he visited that city, the event being the laying of the cornerstone of the Methodist church.

The centenarian has a keen sense of humor and believes in practicing some of the health rules as set forth by Dr. Charles Barker, the national health expert. Vogel looks like a man of 60 and his hearing and sight are unimpaired. His step, too, in spite of his old age, is firm and steady. All of these things he attributes largely to long walks and early rising.

Calvin Jones Boyd

On May 14, 1919, death entered our community and claimed as its reward one of our oldest and best known citizens, Calvin Jones Boyd. Mr. Boyd was born near Somerville, Tennessee March 9, 1843 and with the exception of a few years had spent his entire life in and near there.

There were eleven children in the family, all of whom with father and mother have passed over the "Silent River" save one brother, L. L. Boyd, of Kemp, Texas.

Mr. Boyd was but 18 years old when the Civil War began, and when the call came, enlisted and served with Gen. N. B. Forest Regiment through the struggle.

Among some of the famous battles that he contributed his part to were the battles of Shiloh, the Field of Blood, "Batle above the Clouds" and Chickamauga.

He was well known as a teacher, having taught in the schools in this county at intervals for nearly thirty five years. He was married January, 21, 1897 to Mrs. Lillian L. Gilliam this county. To this union was born one daughter who with a stepdaughter and one son survive him, Mrs. T. B. Henley of Somerville and Mrs. A. J. Wiles of Laconia.

Several years ago he professed faith in Christ as his Saviour and united with the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. Funeral services were held at Union Church conducted by Rev. C. A. Harper. "C"

"WITH ALLENBY IN PALESTINE"

Sacred Views Also to Be Shown at Methodist Celebration.

Would you like to fly from Cairo to Jerusalem?

Would you like to hover over the pyramids and cross, in a few minutes, the country over which the Israelites wandered for 40 years?

Would you like to stand in the cave of Machpelah, before the tombs of Abraham, of Isaac, of Jacob, of Rebecah, of Rachel, where only three Christians have ever stood?

Would you like to go "nose-diving" over Bethlehem at the rate of 150 miles an hour?

Would you like to see Allenby's soldiers capture Jerusalem and Jericho and Christian sentries guarding the Mount of Olives and the Garden of Gethsemane?

The opportunity to do all these things will be presented at the Methodist Centenary celebration at Columbus, O., June 20 to July 13, in the Lowell Thomas travelogue, "With Allenby in Palestine." For, in this talk, illustrated by amazing moving pictures and still photographs, the first authentic eye-witness account by a fully accredited observer of this dashing campaign will be given.

They show the great military operation from its beginning to its end, when the Turk had been driven out of the Holy Land and Allenby stood astride the Berlin-Bagdad railroad at Aleppo, ending the Mittel Europa scheme of the kaiser and the pan-Germans forever.

At \$15 each the pigs are worth..... 120
The sow is worth..... 106

Total.....\$226

Expenses of sow for one year..... 75

Gain in 1 year above all expenses...\$151

But there is a reason for the success Bessie has made with this pig this year and here is the reason: Bessie has a mother and father who stood by her and gave every encouragement possible. Beside this she was connected with the club work and did everything she could to make it a success. If every father and mother in Fayette county would resolve to help his boy and girl in this one thing right now we could have made this the best county in the state in five years. If your boy and girl are not in the pig club see the county agent at once and get them in so they can make preparation to bring the pig to the fair in October.

TOMATO CROP IS IMPORTANT

To Get Best Results Tomatoes Must Be Grown and Sold at The Right Time

COMMUNITY SELLS 1,000 CARS

In Tennessee the Varieties Most Commonly Grown are the Acme, Livingston's Globe and Livingston's Beauty, with Globe Leading in Popularity.

In West Tennessee, in the vicinity of Humboldt, from 800 to 1,000 acres of tomatoes are shipped annually. These are shipped as "pink ripe or green caps". In the latter case the fruit is picked when the blow end or blossom end is just turning white. The fruit is then wrapped in paper and packed in boxes. In the case of pink ripeness the fruit is picked when it is just turning pink. This year in the vicinity of Dayton and Sale Creek, in East Tennessee, pink ripe tomatoes will be shipped for the first time.

The varieties commonly grown for shipment are Acme, Livingston's Globe, and Livingston's Beauty. These are the pink type tomato, globular in shape, firm fleshed, with a rather tough skin, all of which qualities make them excellent shippers. Personally, I like the Livingston Globe best, and I know that the trade is in accord with this view. Regardless of the variety chosen, it is very important that all the farmers in a community agree on one variety. In order to get in on a satisfactory market with this crop it is necessary that rather large plants be put in the open field by April 15. This means that the plants should have been started in January or February and transplanted twice in frames. It is necessary to have the plants early so that the tomatoes can be put on the market sufficiently early to avoid competition with Southern Jersey tomatoes, which begin to arrive on the northern markets the latter part of July. If a large part of the crop overlaps with the Southern Jersey crop, due to high freight rates and rapid deterioration during hot weather, the product seldom pays the freight. This is especially true if the tomatoes are not of the finest quality.

It requires a good bit of time to line up a deal of this kind which will result in satisfactory sales. Also, if the tomatoes have not been started, it is too late to raise plants which would produce a crop sufficiently early to justify shipping to northern markets. Tomatoes must be handled in the proper way, picked at just the right stage of development and picked consistent with trade demands. This requires some experience on the part of the farmers as well as on the part of the person who is handling the deal.
