A committee of the County Board of Education composed of Chairman Wyatt Wilkinson, C. H. The editor ordered last week crimson clover seed to sow his 6 acre cotton field next month. The seed will be sowed broadcast and harrowed in lightly between the cotton rows and when the cotton is picked there should be the finest of pastures ready for the stock. It will be pastured thru the winter (when it is suitable) and again in the spring, till the clover heads out and then it will be turned under for a fertilizing crop and the land planted to corn. We have found this one of the best, easiest and cheapest ways of enriching land, as the pasturage pays for all the expense and trouble. Several acres of land now in corn will be handled in much the same way.

Four weeks ago this afternoon, Friday, this section had its last rain, then but a fair season and only local. Several parts of the county have had good rains since then, but they have all been local and confined to narrow strips of the country and have not done the good that a good soaking general rain would do. Cotton is holding its own remarkably well, but corn, hay, sorghum, in fact everything except cotton has suffered great loss with the severe heat and drought and the condition grows worse every day we are without a rain. Pastures, too, are suffering and many reports of scarcity of stock water are being heard.

On Monday of last week there were two ice handlers and both out of ice, then both got ice and immediately Lightfoot sold out or combined with Locke and one house of ice was closed. Then the price went up to consumers, and there was a supply till toward the end of the week when again the town was without for a time. Late Saturday a car load arrived after dozens of country people had been compelled to go home without their supply. Monday of this week again there was not a bit of ice in town, and dozens of users were forced, as on Saturday, to order from Jackson or Memphis, Whiteville or Oakland, all of which had plenty, at a cost of about \$1.25 per hundred delivered. There are four ice-houses in Somerville, Locke's, Lightfoot's, one at N. & C. depot and one in the rear of the Lipsky building on the west side of the square. Ice factories who have been telephoned and have shipped ice here tell customers they can get ANY AMOUNT of ice wanted.
