Sanitation Helps To Stop Cholera.

"Sanitation in preventing hog cholera is the most important thing that our farmers now have to learn," declares Dr. M. Jacob, state veterinarian. "Many of them have learned the value of vaccination, but have failed to appreciate sanitation."
 Dr. Jacob declares that prevention of the disease is the business of the whole neighborhood. If your herd is afflicted, and a creek of any kind runs through the hog yard, and through your neighbors hog lot, it is your duty to prevent your sick hogs from using that creek, because it is one of the most efficient germ distributors, he says.
 If you will not see that your hogs do

not use the stream, then it becomes your neighbor's duty to see that his hogs are not allowed to approach it.

Germs also can be carried on the clothing, and for this reason, you should not visit on the farm of a neighbor during the time that your hogs are afflicted.

WATCH FOR INDICATIONS.

Nothing causes cholera but the introduction of a virus into the body, which causes fever within five to seven days. Then the animal declines to eat, is constipated or scoured, looks gaunt, has a catarrhal condition of the nose and eyes, and has a weak and staggering walk. The wise policy is not to wait for the appearance of any of these conditions, but vaccinate to prevent them.

Fewer hogs died from cholera during the thirteen months period from April 1, 1918 to April 30, 1919, than have died during any similar period in the livestock history of the United States. The number which died from the disease actually was 2,816,004, and they were valued at \$62,042,688.16. Owing to the very high prices, the monetary loss was very great, although the number of individual animals was the smallest.

Comparative figures show that during the year ending March 31, 1913, hogs numbering 6,964,470 died, and that they had a value of \$68,833,658.

Experiments show that timeliness in vaccinating hogs is all important," says the United States Department of Agriculture, with which the Extension Division, University of Tennessee, is affiliated. "When exposed hogs were vaccinated, while still apparently healthy, losses amounted only to 4 per cent, but when vaccination was deferred until the animal showed external signs of sickness, losses averaged 29 per cent. This shows that the man who puts off the preventive treatment until hogs are sick with cholera stands only about one chance in seven of preventing fatal results. It is important also to maintain hog yards and barns in sanitary condition," the department concludes.
