Her many friends in Somerville will regret that it has been found necessary for Mrs. W. E. Crawford to leave Somerville, in hopes of bettering her condition of health, following the recent death of her husband. Mrs. Crawford left here yesterday, Thursday, for Memphis where she has arranged to have a room and care in the Home for Incurables in that city. She has been a resident of Somerville for about a score of years since her marriage and has won a fine circle of friends here who wish her happiness in her new home.

The magistrates of the county should take notice of the change in the law as to the admission of patients at the Asylum. Heretofore magistrates have had the power to commit patients after holding an inquest in their respective districts. The Act of 1919 takes this power out of the magistrates in general and vests it solely in the Chairman or Judge of the County Court. Hereafter it will be necessary under the law for some person to report cases of insanity to the County Court Clerk, accompanied by an affidavit giving the name of the patient, his residence, condition and setting forth the fact of his insanity, and requesting the Clerk to call the matter to the attention of the Chairman, so that the necessary papers may be asped for an inquest to be held by the Chairman of the court. The law makes it his duty to hold such inquests without extra compensation, and also requires the County Physician to act as physician without additional compensation. The Act is Chapter 17 of Public Acts. —Furnished The Falcon by the County Court Clerk's Office.

The Somerville Bank & Trust Company a few days ago bought from J. L. Mayo the brick block on the northwest corner of the public square and which is now occupied by Price Drug Company and Bloom and Mitchell. It is the intention of the bank to move to the corner building as soon as possession can be secured to that property and make it the home of the institution. The building is admirably suited by location for the bank's home, and it is contemplated by the bank's officials to thoroughly fit it for a modernly equipped banking institution. The building now occupied by the bank and owned by it will be sold or leased when the bank leaves it for its new home.

In the supplemental registration held here this week precedent to the coming city election on May 12, there were 27 voters registered in the three days. Of these 27 there were 14 women. In the regular registration last August 64 women registered, making 78 women in Somerville qualified to vote in the city election. In the average city election held in the past less than 200 votes have generally been cast, more than this number occasionally. It will be seen that more than one fourth of the qualified voters in the coming election are women and their vote is bound to have its effect if they vote the same ticket and if there should be opposing tickets in the field. Thus far no candidates are out except the ones mentioned last week, there being two candidates for none of the offices except Recorder for which J. G. Hendon and J. D. Khea are both candidates.

The County Board of Education met last Friday in quarterly session and attended to a mass of routine business connected with the operation of the schools. They fixed the salaries of the teachers in the schools for next year at substantial raises over the present salaries, made possible by the action of the County Court at its recent meeting, and appointed Monday, April 26, as the date on which the next meeting will be held and the time for the election of teachers for the schools which open about August 1 and September 1. All district authorities who desire to recommend teachers for their schools should have their recommendations in the hands of the County Superintendent or member of the County Board by that date. Teachers are going to be scarce again and every vacancy in the county will be filled as far as it is possible on April 26, regardless of whether recommendations have been made by local authorities.

"Everybody in overalls until the price of clothing comes down" is the Somerville slogan this week. An agreement to wear overalls until the clothing prices are reduced was circulated here Wednesday and was signed by the mayor, several Aldermen, every county official in the courthouse, bank officials, and citizens and business men generally. Thursday saw largely more than half the men of Somerville dressed in bran new overalls and about their customary daily tasks. The movement has spread from city to city over the entire country and if persisted in throughout the states will have its effect in reducing speculative prices of men's clothes, but look out for the prices of overalls and see them jump.
